Silverton — The Silverton planning commission had a lengthy session at the city hall Monday evening with Rhodin Cooley, president, in charge.

George Manolis, chairman of the recreational and athletic committee, accompanied by his committee members, Guy DeLay, Bill McDonald and the director, Paul Reiling, with Charles Hoyt, also a committee member, asked the commission to favorably consider and recommend to the city council members that an assessment of five mills be levied on city property owners to support the athletic and recreational program for the summer months.

A local citizen asked the approval of the commission to operate a taxi service in Silverton.

Polk Salvage Effort Remains
