Waggoner has been elected as a member of the West Salem teaching staff to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Mrs. Myrtle Clark who has accepted the position of county supervisor of Lane county and has moved to Eugene. This new faculty member will have the newly created staff post of assistant principal as well as serving as coach and shop instructor.

Mr. Waggoner is a graduate of the Oregon College of Education at Monmouth and had teaching experience in the Silverton schools last year following his discharge from the armed forces serving in the Pacific. The Waggoners reside in Liberty at present.

Albany Lacks Six Teachers

Albany—School bells will ring for the fall opening of all public schools in Albany Monday morning, September 17, it is announced by City School Superintendent R. E. McCormack.

A new departure this year for the Albany system, Superintendent McCormack said, will be the combining of the junior high schools of Madison and Central schools, with junior high classes being held at Central with the exception of two seventh grade sections which will remain at Madison.

The six primary rooms will be moved to Maple, where 12 classes will be available, including the six new prefabricated units. The move will also provide 19 elementary rooms at the Madison school.

The shift is being made, McCormack said, on recommendation of Dr. C. A. Huffaker, of the University of Oregon school of education, who is making a continued survey of the Albany school system, at the request of the board.

Better educational offers will be possible in the larger unit, give the school more prestige and improved unification of Albany's population, McCormack said.

There will be 22 new teachers on the school staffs this fall, including six vacancies which have not yet been filled, Mr. McCormack said.
