Polk Harvests Need Pickers

Dallas—With one local hop yard now operating, others scheduled to start Monday, bean picking still in full swing and prune harvest looming, Ray Kliever, farm labor assistant, is emphasizing the urgent need of harvest workers to save Polk county crops.

Two hundred pickers can be placed in the hops and 75 are needed at once to save the bean crop now hitting the peak. Heaviest demand will be for prune pickers with 400 workers requested to register at the Dallas farm labor office at once. Some growers are predicting that prune harvest will be in full swing in various parts of the county by September 10. An earlier harvest, with prune picking overlapping hop picking would bring about a desperate situation, growers state.

Local workers are asked to investigate the possibility of working in the Dallas vicinity before seeking employment elsewhere. Every individual who can spare the time to help with the harvest should contact the farm labor office in the Dallas city hall immediately.

Volunteer Troops Pick Bean Harvest

Albany—More than 200 enlisted men at Camp Adair Wednesday volunteered to go into the Linn county bean fields to help the growers clean up their crops. It was announced by W. V. Merrill, farm labor assistant, who had received the word from Maj. Gen. Mallon. The men were transported to the fields at noon.

Merrill stated that the soldiers' help would put the growers on top in their efforts to get the bean crop cleaned up within the next few days. It was stated by growers that unless immediate help was forthcoming the remainder of the perishable crop would be lost. A number of late bean crops were in the process of being picked.

Timber Blaze Proves Costly

Lebanon — Brought under control Monday after three days' rampage, the first which burned over approximately 500 acres of cut-over timber belonging to the Round Top Logging company caused an estimated damage of \$45,000.

The fire was discovered August 24 by loggers one and a half miles off the Quartzville road. The origin of the blaze is unknown. Wayne Downing's crew, members of the Linn county fire association, aided by loggers from the Emmert brothers logging camp, the Swamp Mountain Logging company, and the Powers-Davis Lumber company, brought the fire under control, although Wednesday logs in some sectors of the operation were still flaming.

Logs from the Round Top operation were brought to the Long Bell pond in Sweet Home for reloading and have been going to the Grown Zellerbach paper mill and the Cascades Plywood corporation in Lebanon.
