

## West Salem School Directors Make Final Fall Arrangement

West Salem, Sept. 13.—The school directors held their final meeting Tuesday night prior to the opening of the fall term of school. A decision was made to proceed with previous plans to open September 17 but arrangements will be made to excuse students who are still engaged in harvesting work during the first several weeks of school.

Older students who can furnish proof of employment in essential conservation of food products, will be given the opportunity to make up their work when they enter school late. Purchase of additional school

room equipment was postponed until the opening of school and the need can be definitely determined. The policy to be followed in the renting of the gymnasium will also be delayed until the matter can be studied by the directors.

Means of staying within budgeted funds was discussed and the proposal was made and adopted, that henceforth any purchase of school supplies or equipment in excess of \$25 should be approved by the board of directors before the purchase is made. Further limitations on purchases or appointment of a purchasing committee will not be made unless the need arises.

Albert Ramseyer, director, stated his intention to present his resignation as a board member prior to the October meeting. Ramseyer, serving the second year of his term, will leave the West Salem school district when he moves early in October to DeLuxe where he plans to enter the furniture and appliance business. Manner of selecting his successor will be determined after a formal resignation is received.

West Salem—Billy Bouffler, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Bouffler, is again hospitalized in the Salem General hospital as the result of injury incurred last winter in a tractor accident. Following a long hospitalization Billy was dismissed only to again break his leg in July of this year.
