

Ace Greeted By Children

San Francisco, Sept. 13 (AP)—Two youngsters rushed into the arms of Maj. Gregory Boyington in a San Francisco hotel room yesterday and the moment the marine corps ace had dreamt of during 20 months in Japanese prison camps came true.

"Well, if it isn't my dad," chorused Gregory, Jr., 10, and Janet, 7.

The flyer's two older children and his mother, Mrs. E. J. Hallenbeck of Brewster, Wash., had been flown to meet him here as guests of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

"My, it's good to see you," the major, 32, told his children. And to his mother, he said, "You don't know how often I've thought of this the last 20 months."

Mrs. Hallenbeck waited, smiling, while the two children hugged the father they had not seen for nearly three years. Then she said:

"Isn't it time for me to greet the conquering hero?" With the children still clinging to him, he threw his arms around his mother.

Major Boyington expects to fly to Seattle after five days here, and then he's going to Brewster to make good on his promise to "take that boy of mine hunting."

When his leave is over, the marine corps plans to fly the major to Washington, D. C., to receive the Congressional Medal of Honor, awarded him while he was missing. A navy cross also awaits him in the national capital.

Gene Rambo is Favored to Win

Pendleton, Ore., Sept. 13, (AP)—The 34th annual Pendleton round-up went into its second riotous day today as thousands of wild west enthusiasts crowded into the round-up arena to see their favorite buckaroos ride the bucking broncos and the rampaging steers.

Badger Mountain, a bucking bronc, featured as the world's best, held the spotlight with last year's all-around cowboy champion, Gene Rambo of Shendon, Calif.

Badger Mountain's pseudocartwheel caught Bill Linderman, Red Lodge, Montana cowboy by surprise Wednesday, throwing the top-notch cowpuncher in one minute flat.

Gene Rambo, 1944 winner of the Sam Jackson trophy, was still the favorite of the crowd to cop the trophy again this year. He stayed on Butterfly in the world's champion bucking contest and established a low time of 10.2 seconds to take sixth place in calf roping.

The city of Pendleton itself was overflowing with humanity—western style. Business men and Indians mixed in the city streets, greeting each other with the western "howdy."

Today, eliminations began for 143 of the nation's premier handymen at bronc busting, bulldogging, calf and steer roping. Brahma steer riding strut their stuff for \$16,800 in prize money.

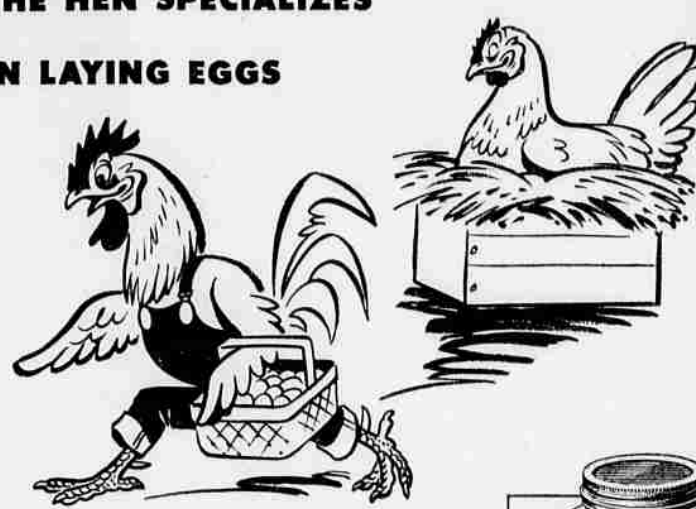
