Polk County Road Projects Scheduled

Dallas, Ore.—Polk county engineering crews under County Engineer Edward J. Hinmes, courthouse, are scheduled to construct five road projects as follows: (1) relocation of 2 1/2 miles of the Hopville road, requiring rock surfacing and grading to be followed by oiling in a few years; preliminary sketches and survey completed; (2) 3/4-mile heavy grading, rock surfacing on the Dallas-Perrydale road, oiling later; (3) relocation of 2 1/2 miles of Brush College road, including heavy grading, concrete culverts, rock surfacing and later oiling (4) widening of two miles of the Glen Creek road, requiring grading, resurfacing with rock and oil; (5) relocation of four miles of road from Clow Corner west to join the Dallas-Monmouth cut-off, requiring rock surfacing, with oiling later.

Silverton Fire Victims' Funeral Rites Indefinite

Silverton—The body of Mrs. Elinor Elmore was definitely identified when recovered Sunday from the debris of the apartment home in which she and her three small children lost their lives in a fire early Saturday morning that completely destroyed the building, according to word late Sunday of Ernest R. Ekman, local mortician.

Dr. L. E. Barrick, coroner, had not been recalled to Silverton, according to Ekman, since being here Saturday most of the day when the bodies of the three children, Sandra 2, Billy 4, and Betty Juan 6 years of age were recovered and identified by teeth markings. Guards were placed about the place Sunday afternoon and the public will be kept from going near the burned home until the coroner makes his second visit.

The Elmore occupied the upper story of the duplex frame house, 4471 Maple street. The owners of the place, Mr. and Mrs. Peter Cooper, lived in the lower floor apartment and were in Portland where Cooper has employment, at the time of the tragedy.

Mrs. Elmore's husband, William Elmore, is in the service and now located in an Illinois camp. He has been notified and is expected home today. Mrs. Elmore was a native of Linn county. Her father is Alva Leeper of Swiss Home, and her mother, Mrs. Hazel Minnehan, lives in San Mateo, Calif. A sister, Mrs. Loyal Timm, resides in Silverton, one brother, Pfc. Hugh Leeper is now in Japan, and another brother, Sgt. Leonard Leeper, is in Okinawa.

Final rites for the four will be observed on arrival of the immediate members of the family.

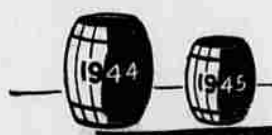
