Dallas Victory Drive Launched

Dallas—With the appointment of district chairman to head the victory drive of the United War Fund in Polk county, soliciting is now underway in practically all sections of the county, according to William Blackley, county chairman.

A total of \$13,228 is sought, with district quotas approximately the same as those of last year. Although the amount was exceeded last year, two factors are expected to make the quota difficult to attain this year, according to Blackley. The first is the fact that, with the war over, the public may have a tendency to think there is no longer a necessity for such funds; the second is the lumber strikes affecting over 700 men in the county. The need for funds for work of agencies included in the drive is stressed by Blackley, who is urging every person to contribute the maximum possible.
