The group will sew for the bazaar during the afternoon. All members of the South Section are urged to attend.

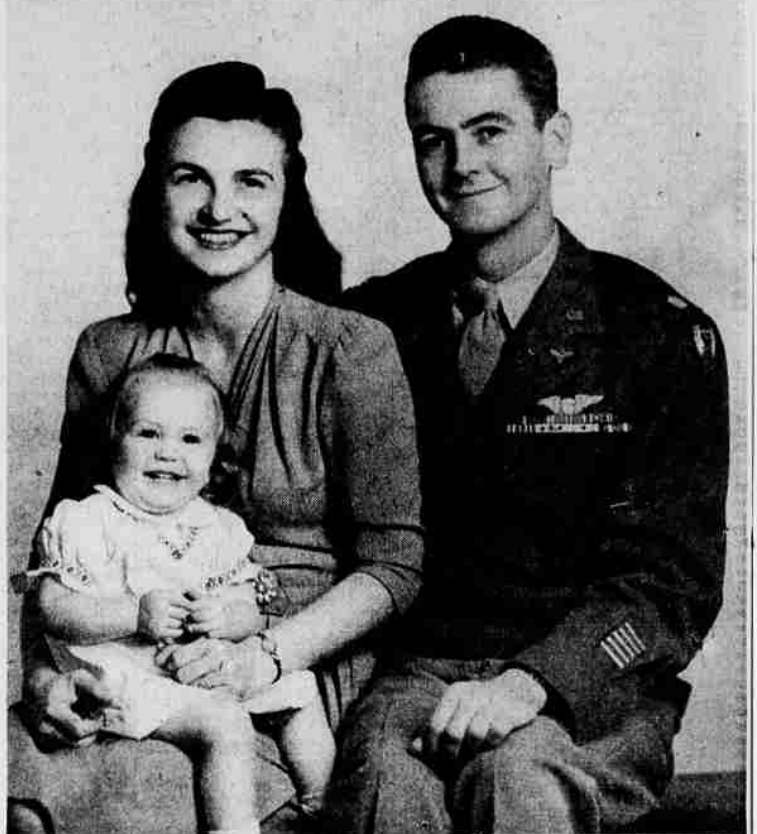
