'Let Them Die' Kramer's Edict

Lueneburg, Germany, Oct. 13 (AP)—Herta Ehlert, SS women's supervisor at Belsen, testified today she complained to Commandant Josef Kramer last spring about conditions in the concentration camp and he replied: "Let them die. I can't do anything about it. My hands are tied."

The 40-year-old blonde, accused with Kramer and 43 others of war crimes at Belsen, declared "I was sick of the smell of the camp."

The military court hearing the case has agreed to view a Russian film of the Oswiecim camp, where Kramer previously served despite a defense argument that it was propaganda which would prejudice the prisoners' case.

The defense opposed the proposal to introduce the film as a move to inject Russian propaganda into the trial at a moment best calculated to prejudice the defense case, but Prosecutor Col. T. M. Backhouse replied that the picture was offered as evidence as soon as it was received and viewed by the prosecution.

The film was loaned by the Soviet government after weeks of negotiation. Erika Schopf, first volunteer witness for the defense, testified as the trial was resumed that certain prosecution witnesses attempted to prevent her appearance.

Striking Draft Board Gets Public Support

Washington Courthouse, O., Oct. 13 (AP)—Chairman Howard D. Fogle of the "striking" Fayette county draft board, said today that "the public seems to be with us in our campaign to halt inductions until the government cleans up all these strikes."

Fogle and his fellow board members sat tight on their decision to refuse to induct county draftees. The state board in Columbus was considering the situation but no official announcement was forthcoming.

Fogle said his mail was getting heavier all the time and that most of the mail and telegrams he was receiving showed the public was on his side.

Jap Black Market Skyrocketing

Tokyo, Oct. 13 (AP)—Skyrocketing black markets have pushed the price of staple foods up to as much as 80 times the fixed rate in Japan's urban areas, the Domei News agency reported today.

Many dealers on the black market have been arrested after charging as much as \$8 for less than two quarts of rice and other food stuffs in proportion. Domei reported that several hundred army and navy personnel, including some high ranking officers, were being tried before court martial boards now for black market operations after surrender.

In a ceremony to be held at the Salem armory Monday night at 8 o'clock General Raymond C. Olson will award service ribbons to officers and men of the Salem units of the Oregon state guard who have served one, two, and three years. Relatives, friends and the public are invited.

Senate Okays PAC Director

Washington, Oct. 12 (AP)—The senate after vigorous debate Thursday confirmed the nomination of Raymond S. McKeough, midwest director of the CIO political action committee, for membership on the U.S. maritime commission. The vote was 42 to 34.

Confirmation followed an unfavorable report on the nomination by the commerce committee and a spirited senate debate in which it was charged that McKeough would not be an impartial member of the commission because of his CIO connection.

McKeough, a former member of congress and former Chicago regional OPA director, was strongly opposed by the AFL. Had he been disapproved, he would have been the first Truman appointee to fail of senate confirmation.

Opposition in the senate centered on his PAC-CIO connection, which Sen. John H. Overton (D., La.), said might cause differences between the powerful AFL and CIO maritime unions to explode into strikes.

Movie Strikers Ignore Decision

Hollywood, Oct. 12 (AP)—Leaders of striking movie studio unions said today that mass picketing would continue until the industry met all union demands. This ultimatum was issued despite the legal end of the strike yesterday when painters local 1421 (AFL) was awarded jurisdiction over 78 set dressers, crux of the dispute over which the walkout began seven months ago.

The union's demands included return of all strikers to work without prejudice and renewal of contracts with the striking unions, and setting up machinery to handle other jurisdictional disputes in the film industry.

The unionists also want reinstatement in their jobs of all strikers without prejudice, the renewal of all labor contracts and the establishment of machinery to handle other jurisdictional controversies.

Eric Johnston, newly elected movie czar, was to arrive in Hollywood today, and reports were he was summoned by producers to bring a hasty end to the strike.

Shipping Pool Ends March 2

Washington, Oct. 12 (AP)—The United Nations' shipping pool will be terminated March 2, 1946.

This was announced today after a meeting of the executive board of the united maritime authority.

Prior to March 2, various controls over shipping in the pool will be relaxed or eliminated.

The first major step will be the release Oct. 31 of tankers from the control of the authority. Some tankers, however, will be allocated to meet the requirements of nations which do not have sufficient tankers for their own needs.

Another step will be establishment of limited commercial areas. Tonnage will be assigned each area by the authority. There was no indication how soon commercial areas might be established.

The executive board also decided to relax its restrictions on the transfer of its vessels to non-member nations. Before a vessel can be transferred, however, the authority must decide that it is not required for the pool.

Vice Admiral Emory S. Land, war shipping administrator, told the board this country intended to establish a reserve pool of about 2000 ships.

Chief Justice Stone Has 73rd Birthday

Washington, Oct. 12 (AP)—Chief Justice Harlan Fiske Stone, 73, Thursday got a phone call. It was President Truman wishing him a "happy birthday."

He planned to spend the working hours at the same place he has been the last 20 years—sitting on the high mahogany bench listening to lawyers present arguments on cases appealed to the supreme court. No special celebration was arranged for the remainder of the anniversary.

Vergeer Injured In Truck Collision

J. M. Vergeer, 70, truck driver was taken to Portland for hospitalization Friday after a collision a mile north of Turner between his vehicle and a dump truck driven by Lewis Meyer of Salem. It was believed Vergeer's injuries were not of critical nature.

\$73,500 Pledge For War Chest

The Columbus day holiday interfered to some extent Friday with the progress of the United War Chest campaign and two divisions failed to report because of the closure of banks and public institutions. Nevertheless the 10 divisions that did turn in their collections during the past 24 hours boosted the total to \$73,500 or 73 1/2 percent of the \$100,000 being sought. One division—educational—headed by Carl Aschenbrenner of Parish Junior high school, has more than completed its quota. The schools, divided into two groups—adults and pupils—have contributed \$4032, or 108 percent of the quota. The professional division, with Ed Majek at the helm, is within 4 percent of completing its job. Majek's workers reported a total of \$9638 or 96 percent of the \$10,000 quota.

Truckers Ask Vote on Strike

Washington, Oct. 12 (AP)—A request for a strike vote by AFL teamsters in 3,190 trucking companies operating in 12 middle western states was filed today with the national labor relations board.

NLRB said it had no idea how many thousands of truckers might be involved in the balloting request filed by the Chicago office of the Central States Drivers' Council under the Smith-Connally act.

The action coincided with another day's failure to get a back-to-work agreement on the soft coal strike and with vocal support in congress for new anti-strike legislation—including repeal of the Smith-Connally measure.

The teamsters strike poll—which will be taken 30 days hence if the petition is found in order—may cover many other employers beyond the 3,190 listed.

The dispute was described as being over the inability of union and employers to reach agreement on the central states "over-the-road" labor agreement.

The 12 states immediately involved are Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska and Kansas.

Meanwhile, Secretary of Labor Schwellenbach recessed coal strike conferences with operators and miners until tomorrow, with no hint of progress.

Mrs. Mansfelt Tried Suicide

San Francisco, Oct. 12 (AP)—Mrs. Annie Irene Mansfelt was saved from suicide by her now-dead husband on at least three separate occasions in the past 11 years when she attempted to hang herself, turned on a kitchen gas range and deliberately took an overdose of sleeping tablets, her attorney said today.

Vincent Hallinan, close personal friend of the late Dr. John H. Mansfelt, who died by his own hand eight days ago shortly after his wife killed a nurse she feared was a rival for his affections, said Mansfelt each time had been able to revive her without the aid of police or public health authorities.

The alleged incidents were not reported to police, Hallinan said, to avoid "possible publicity."

James McInnes, associate counsel for the defense at Mrs. Mansfelt's prospective trial for the murder of Mrs. Vada Martin, indicated the defense would plead innocent on the "unwritten law" as well as insanity. He announced his client plans to take the stand in her own defense to "tell her story to the world."

Hallinan said that two of Mrs. Mansfelt's ancestors had been committed to state institutions for the insane more than 30 years ago.

Father, Two Sons Dead in Tragedy

Livingston, Mont., Oct. 13 (AP)—Coroner Robert Franzen planned to hold an inquest today into the tragedy which resulted in the slaying of two Livingston youngsters and the subsequent suicide of their father here yesterday.

William R. Reese, 30-year-old war worker, who had returned home only the previous night from Oakland, Calif., shot his two children—Johnny 8, and Janie who would have been 4 Sunday—while they were playing in bed awaiting their grandmother's call to breakfast yesterday morning, the coroner asserted.

Reese then shot himself in the head, Franzen declared. He died two hours later. Notes, saying Reese grieved over being partially paralyzed in one leg and "domestic difficulties," were found under the children's pillows, Franzen added.

The children's mother, Mrs. Lucille Reese, had left for work shortly before the tragedy.

Miss Jo Anne Lang, 180 Garden road, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Lang, is recovering from an appendectomy at the Deaconess hospital.

24 Persons Forgive Army

Seattle, Oct. 12 (AP)—The army was forgiven today by 24 persons, including seven mothers, for sending them rushing to San Francisco in the mistaken belief their sons and husbands, returning prisoners of war, would arrive at that port from the Orient.

These happy people were waiting at the pier here this morning for the expected arrival of the U.S.S. Gosper with her large load of passengers.

They were flown north late yesterday by the army after it had discovered the ship was bound not for San Francisco but for Seattle.

For most of them it was their first plane flight and they enjoyed the trip up the coast in the big C-47 transport.

Mrs. Vera Humphrey, who has been spending a few days in the city, has left for Medford where she has opened the Junior Red Cross shop. She presided Saturday noon at the first JRC luncheon of the season when teachers of Jackson county met to plan the fall program of the junior organization.
