

Ministers Hit Back at Vaughan

Washington, Oct. 19 (AP)—The general commission on army and navy chaplains said Thursday that "highly offensive" remarks by President Truman's military aide have placed a "sigma" on protestant chaplains.

In a resolution sent to Mr. Truman, the commission asked "official repudiation" of remarks attributed to his aide, Brig. Gen. Harry Vaughan.

The remarks to which the commission objected appeared in Time magazine. Vaughan was quoted as saying:

"I don't know why a minister can't be a regular guy, but unfortunately some of them are not. You have to give the Roman church credit. When the war department requests a bishop to supply 20 priests for chaplains, he looks over his diocese and picks out the 20 best men. But it is different in the protestant church. Frequently a protestant (minister) does not have a church at the moment, or is willing to go on a vacation for about three years."

The commission said these remarks were "highly offensive and prejudicial to the service of the protestant chaplains, since protestants are asked to provide 68 percent of all the chaplains."

It added that Gen. Vaughan has done a "great disservice to thousands of his fellow officers" and that "chaplains who have made great sacrifices and won imperishable honor are deeply insulted."

The commission, which represents 30 protestant faiths and is directed by Bishop Edwin F. Lee of the Methodist church, asserted Vaughan's remarks are "calculated to cause ill feeling between religions."

Gen. Vaughan told a reporter he had no comment.

World Federation Necessary to Peace

Only a world federation can prevent a third world war, Dr. Vernon Nash told the Salem Knife and Fork club Thursday night. Dr. Nash is executive director of the National Peace conference. "The only hope in the United Nations," he said, "is that its machinery will be used to move swiftly to world government." Should there be another war he said it would start in China.


