Home Cannery Nearing Close

Silverton—Mrs. Carl Specht, chairman of the executive committee of the community cannery projects, is announcing that Tuesday, October 30, will be the last day's run for the season and is urging all who have last minute material to can to make immediate plans for having this work done before the last day, if possible. Work at the cannery begins at 1 p.m.

Although the home canning project did not begin until late in August due to the slowness of getting the building ready, by October 9, the report of the amount canned for the season was more than 14,000 cans. The board of directors includes 14 members of the rural communities and local citizens, with Leonard Hudson serving as secretary. The members of the executive committee are Mrs. Carl Specht, Mrs. E. A. Beugly, Mrs. Thomas Bump, Oscar Loe and Theodore Hobart, selected from the board group.

Albany to Try 'Curbs Bandits'

Albany—Members of the Albany city council Wednesday night passed an ordinance authorizing the mayor and city recorder to enter into a contract with the Duncan Meter corporation to install 327 parking meters in the Albany business district on a six-months' trial basis, with the provision that at the end of the half-year period the meters may be eliminated without cost to the city. The contract further provides that if the city decides at the end of the trial period to purchase the meters payments may be made from revenues.

The council took this action in the hope of solving the local parking problem, which it was asserted is becoming daily more acute here, to the extent that farmers coming to town to trade are being compelled to park at a great distance from the business district because local residents are hogging parking space. The meters will cost the city \$75 each, if they are finally purchased, and it was estimated by the councilmen that if they are retained they will yield revenues sufficient to cover the cost in about a year and a half. Installation is expected to be completed in from 60 to 90 days and operation to start January 1.
