Bloody Butcher Corn Thrives In Hills Section Says Drake

Silverton—J. D. Drake, local photographer and farmer hobbyist of the Silverton Hills section, is proud of the results of 20 years experience in proving that corn can be raised successfully in the higher altitude of the hills and come to maturity.

The farmers felt that corn could not be produced for feed in that district, and Drake wrote his troubles to a seed firm in Portland who sent him samples of the Bloody Butcher variety which made the grade fairly well.

Incidentally, Drake has reserved one ear of the Bloody Butcher crop that did develop well from the seed samples the first year.

By continued cross pollination of the Bloody Butcher with the Yellow Dent, Drake has a variety that matured early and escapes the first frosts in the hills. He was drying out three sacks of seed corn at his down town place of business Saturday, when asked for an explanation of the fine quality and size of the ears of corn. The stalks average a height of 6 to 9 feet on the hills ranch.

Drake has brought to the local markets this autumn, many crates of strawberries after the regular season is over. The berries have been of splendid flavor and size.
