

Hoblitt Tells Of Jap Prison

Silverton — Sergeant Frederick Marion Hoblitt and Corporal Sheldon Cunningham were introduced as special guests last night at the Armistice day program sponsored by Delbert Reeves Post No. 7 and the auxiliary at the Legion hall following a group dinner for veterans and members of their families with Roy Davenport master of ceremonies, introduced by Arthur Gottenberg, who presided.

Sergeant Hoblitt, speaker for the joint program open to the public, recounted his experiences in Japan and Corregidor, being a prisoner of the Japanese until the signing of cessations from war. Hoblitt mentioned the unusualness of the four Silverton young men, Cunningham, Zahler, Baker and himself, as being safe in the United States after knowing the treatment accorded prisoner "guests" of the Japanese. His talk was ably presented and received with interest.

Mrs. C. J. Towe led in group singing preceding the address. Sergeant Hoblitt was accompanied by his bride of two weeks who was introduced as honor guest.

The post and unit each held brief business sessions following the early evening dinner.
