

Diary of Slow Death Found With Body of Motorist

Gold Beach, Ore., Nov. 13 (AP)—The diary of a fatally injured motorist told in mite detail today how he lay pinned for nearly two weeks in his wrecked car only 100 feet from a highway and waited for death to release him.

Written on the back of a much-thumbed highway map, the diary related poignantly how Earl Stilson, 78, Gold Beach, prayed for rescue, then calmly resigned himself to death.

Police said Stilson's car plunged from a curve into a woodland depression and overturned at least twice when he lost control. The wreckage was hidden by giant trees and bushes.

Many automobiles passed on the busy Oregon-California coast highway but they apparently moved so fast that their occupants could not see the smashed vehicle, which Stilson was driving north from Eureka, Calif.

Fast New Fighter Plane Announced

Seattle, Nov. 13 (AP)—A fast new fighter plane with a long propeller hub that makes it resemble, somewhat, a swordfish in flight was announced today by the Boeing Aircraft company, which said the ship could slice through the air at more than 450 miles per hour.

The overlong hub is needed to mount the two propellers which operate in tandem off the single 3,600-horsepower, air-cooled engine, rotating in opposite directions.

Termed it the most versatile aircraft ever manufactured, Boeing said the plane could carry a 6,400-pound bomb load or act as an interceptor or attack plane and reach a service ceiling comparable to the B-29 superfortress.

Boeing said the plane was designed and built for the navy and had been test-flown more than 100 hours.

35 Votes Cast in Lakeview Election

Lakeview, Ore., Nov. 13 (AP)—Lyle North of Lakeview is the city's new mayor after a municipal election in the lumber mill center.

North defeated his nearest opponent, Larry Fitzgerald, by two votes. The entire number of votes counted in the election was 35.

Rosenman to Quit Office

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—Judge Samuel I. Rosenman will retire at the end of the year as special counsel to the president, the White House announced today.

Presidential Secretary William D. Hassett made the announcement at a news conference at which he said Rosenman had served both President Truman and former President Franklin D. Roosevelt at a "tremendous personal sacrifice."

Rosenman, who left a \$25,000-a-year post on the New York state supreme court, has been anxious to retire for some months, Hassett said.

Some months ago the White House announced Rosenman had agreed to President Truman's suggestion that he remain on for another year.

"The president," Hassett said, "has consented to his release about the first of the year. As soon as he can be released, Mr. Rosenman is going back to New York to resume the practice of law."

Search for Bombers Stalled by Weather

Portland, Ore., Nov. 13 (AP)—Search for two bombers missing over the northwest since November 1 has been stalled by storms and hazardous flying weather, the army air base reported today.

Officials said any search would be hampered by heavy snow falls that have covered the rugged mountain region where the wreckage may be hidden and that low temperatures in the higher altitudes may have killed any of the nine crewmen who survived the crash.

Airplanes have been kept at southern Oregon fields since the search was taken up a day after the planes failed to land from a Portland-Tacoma one hour flight.

Roy Hackett, Banker, Dies at Grants Pass

Grants Pass, Ore., Nov. 13 (AP)—Funeral services were pending today for Roy K. Hackett, 62, Grants Pass banker who died Monday at the Josephine hospital. He had been at the hospital since October 31 when he suffered a heart attack.

Born in Minnesota, he came to Grants Pass as a small boy and graduated from the local schools. In 1903 he entered the banking business and at the time of death was manager of the Grants Pass branch of the First National Bank of Portland. Last month he was named a vice-president of the Portland bank.

3 lbs. fresh halibut or sea bass, cut in rather thick filets
1 cup chopped onion
1 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup chopped parsley
Salt and pepper to taste
1/2 tsp. thyme
1/2 cup olive oil or other vegetable cooking oil
6 medium-sized potatoes, peeled

Wash the fish, cut in slices for serving, leaving the skin on. Sprinkle 1/2 cup chopped raw onion in the bottom of a large-sized baking pan. Arrange the fish in pan. Cover with the remaining onion, the celery, parsley, salt, pepper and thyme. Add range potatoes around the fish, turning them over in the liquid. Pour 2 cans of Del Monte Tomato Sauce over all.
