Cities with such ordinances do not have to make the ordinances conform with the state law, Neuner said.

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Election Official Puzzled Over Election for Mott's Successor

State election officials today were trying to unravel the state's complicated election laws to determine how to fill the vacancy created by the death yesterday of James W. Mott, Salem, representative in congress from the first Oregon district.

Attorney General George Neuner probably will be called in to settle the issue.

Acting Gov. Howard C. Belton indicated he would call an election, but said he first must determine the procedure. Governor Earl Snell will not return here until about November 22, as he is in California and will go directly from there to the western governors conference in Cheyenne, Wyo.

Of the very few instances when death has disturbed Oregon's representation in congress only the death of Congressman Maurice E. Crumpacker of Portland, third district representative, in 1927 furnishes a precedent for the situation created in the first district Monday by the death of Congressman James W. Mott. And even the Crumpacker case fails to apply exactly for the reason that the third district comprises only one county, while the first district has 10 counties.

After the death of Crumpacker an assembly met and nominated Frank F. Korrell to succeed him. Korrell was a republican, but, under the law, could not be given a party nomination by the assembly. So the district republican nominating committee met and endorsed the nomination, which made it possible for him to appear on the ballot as independent-republican.

The law, according to David O'Hara, elections official in the state department, after consulting legal authority, requires nomination by assembly as in the Korrell case, with not less than 250 voters of the district assembled; or by petition of 3 percent of the voters, which nominates the candidate as an independent. In the first district 3 percent of the voters would be around 4000 names.

The Sinnott-Butler case in the second district in 1928 does not furnish a parallel to the present case. Nicholas J. Sinnott resigned May 29, 1928, to accept a judgeship on the court of customs. The resignation occurred between congressional sessions, and also between a primary and a general election, Sinnott having been nominated earlier that month. Party authorities then ignored the short-term intervening before the November election, but placed Robert R. Butler in nomination for the November election. He was elected and served two terms, dying in Washington after his defeat for a third term by Walter W. Pierce.

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Linn Clubbers Will Have Day

Albany — Linn county 4-H club members will have a county-wide achievement meeting Saturday, November 17, in Albany, N. John Hansen, county club agent states.

This will be the first county-wide 4-H achievement meeting since November 1941. During the war years community achievement meetings were held throughout the county.

The purpose of the achievement meeting is to give recognition to the 4-H members who have successfully completed a 4-H club project, to create interest in the 4-H club work and to have the cooperation of various business firms and organizations that are sponsoring various 4-H activities.

Preliminary plans include a parade and the achievement program at which time special awards and achievement pens and certificates will be presented.

The parade, which is a highlight of the program, will be put on by 4-H club members and leaders. The Albany high school auditorium will be the scene of the indoor meetings. A lunch, with the members bringing their own lunches, will be served in the gymnasium.

In the afternoon, following the parade the presentation of summer school scholarships, gold medals, special awards, 4-H achievement pens and certificates will be featured.

Governor Earl Snell will attend the western conference of governors in Cheyenne, Wyo., before returning to Salem on November 23, it was reported here today.

Governor Snell has been in California conferring with Gov. Earl Warren of that state. He left San Diego last night for Wyoming. The three day conference in Cheyenne will start Sunday.

Meanwhile important decisions rest with Acting Governor Howard C. Belton, president of the state senate. Among them are the question of commutation for Andrew W. Dennis, who is sentenced to die in the state prison Friday for the slaying of his mother-in-law.

Belton said this morning that he had no comment to make regarding Dennis, but admitted he had been studying the case intently.

County Business Increase Revealed by County Clerk

Increase in county business is reflected in some tables prepared by County Clerk Henry Mattson showing the rapidly growing totals of fees collected in various offices for the period from 1939 up to the first nine months of 1945. In the county clerk's office the total for fees collected in 1939 was \$16,871 while for the first nine months of 1945 the total reached \$21,778.98 with three months to go. In 1944 the total was \$25,333.63 and this year may exceed that figure quite materially when the final three months are computed. The big increases have been in the past two or three years the figures showing the intervening years as follows: 1940, \$18,512.85; 1941, \$18,196.49; 1942, \$18,911.73; 1943, \$21,849.22. While the fees are increasing along with the population, also some additional work has been imposed from time to time by various legislatures which cause a relative expansion of the totals.

For the sheriff's office in fees and mileage, the total fees collected in 1939 were \$1831.95 as against \$1541.56 for the first nine months of 1945. The fees and mileage for that office have not increased since 1939, the figures for the intervening years being 1940, \$1517.20; 1941, \$1404.23; 1942, \$1632.98; 1943, \$1535.22 and 1944, \$1723.99.

Salem justice court fees and mileages, however, have been on the upgrade, the total for 1939 having been \$3900.25 while already for the first nine months of 1945 they have reached a figure of \$3610 and so will probably exceed the 1939 figure very materially. In fact, for intervening years they have been going up as indicated by the figures: 1940, \$3817; 1941, \$4427.50; 1942, \$5216.70; 1943, \$4533; 1944, \$4790.

Fees for the county recorder's office also have been on a steady pull upgrade. In 1939 these totaled \$15,359.58 but are close to that figure for the first nine months of 1945 and will go way out ahead of it by the end of the year. The steady climb shown by these fees is reflected in the figures for the intervening years as follows: 1940, \$16771.10; 1941, \$16,811.05; 1942, \$13,351.80; 1943, \$16,520.8; 1944, \$17,935.45. In the recorder's office a considerable share of the increase has been due to activity in real estate, but this, like the clerk's office, has been invested with new duties by the legislature from time to time which fact shows up in the mounting fees.

Molotov Eases Press Censorship

Moscow, Nov. 12 (P)—Soviet censorship of outgoing news dispatches, recently protested by American and British correspondents in Moscow, appears to have been reduced to a mere formality.

There has been no official announcement of a change in Russian policy and foreign correspondents still are submitting their dispatches for stamping by the censors. But for almost a week all Associated Press dispatches have been passed without any deletions—an experience shared by other correspondents.

The first hint of a possible relaxation of censorship restrictions came the night of Nov. 7 during a friendly conversation between Soviet Foreign Commissar Vyacheslav Molotov and Associated Press Correspondent Eddy Gilmore, when they clinked glasses in a toast to better Russian-American understanding.

Rev. Mother St. Anne and Sister Gertrude plan to return to Yokohama after touring the 25 monasteries of their order in Canada to raise money for a new monastery to replace "Our Lady of Victory."

Portland, Nov. 12 (P)—Commissioner Kenneth L. Cooper was acting mayor today. Mayor Riley left last night for the American municipal association meeting in Chicago.

General Waitt Chief Of Chemical Warfare

Washington, Nov. 13 (P)—President Truman today nominated Brig. Gen. Alden Harry Waitt for chief of the chemical warfare service, with the rank of major general.

The president also nominated Rear Admiral Oswald S. Sloeclough to be judge advocate general of the navy. He will continue at his present rank.

Lien Decision Affirmed

Washington, Nov. 13 (P)—The supreme court today affirmed a decision that a lien obtained by the federal government against a delinquent income taxpayer applies to property which the taxpayer acquires later.
