## Stalemate In Printers' Strike

Seattle, Nov. 21 (AP)—Abandoning hope for any immediate end to a printers' strike which has halted publication of three Seattle newspapers since Sunday, Larry Taylor, international vice president of the Typographical Union (AFL) prepared to leave by plane for Indianapolis, Ind., today.

Taylor, declining to comment on the deadlock in negotiations on union demands for a \$2.95 daily wage increase and a publishers' offer of \$1.65, said negotiations would continue locally after his departure. "I have business to attend to at the Indianapolis main office," he said, "and cannot wait here any longer."

A spokesman for the publishers of the strike-bound morning Post-Intelligencer, and the afternoon papers, Star and Times, concurred in the opinion that "the strike seems to be settling down for a long haul" with both sides expressing willingness to negotiate "at any time" but both remaining firm.

Union picket lines remained intact around the three newspaper plants with the union local permitting skeleton staffs to pass through the lines to maintain the various department offices.

## Miss Coe Goes To Coronado

Program director and assistant director at the Salem USO club since August 14 of this year, Miss Lucy Coe will leave next week for Coronado, Calif., where she will become a member of the staff of the army-navy YMCA-USO center in that city.

Miss Coe, who came here from the Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, USO, where she was program director for 11 months and acting director for a month, received her orders to report to the California city this morning in a telegram from George Martin, army-navy YMCA-USO regional supervisor with offices in San Francisco.

The Salem USO program director prior to entering USO work was secretary to the editor of publications at the University of Illinois for several years. On leave of absence from the University of Illinois to become associated with the USO, Miss Coe recently resigned her position at the university to remain in USO work for the remainder of the emergency.

## Start Drive for Co-op Hospital

A good crowd Tuesday night heard Michael Shadid tell of his experiences in starting his Community hospital at Elk City, Okla., the nation's first cooperative hospital. Dr. Shadid is in the Willamette valley for three weeks' stay during which he will make numerous appearances under the auspices of the Oregon Farmers' Union on behalf of the proposed community health center in Salem. Tuesday's meeting marked the kickoff in a campaign for memberships in the health center which will be open to everyone. It is hoped to raise at least \$50,000 for a completely equipped clinic. Memberships will be limited to 2000 families.

Dr. Shadid said President Truman had made part of his speech for him in his message to congress Monday urging a complete national health program, financed by compulsory health insurance. But he pointed out that self-help, through a cooperative owned by the people using it, was a still better method of meeting health needs.

He assailed the American Medical association for its stand against group medicine, on a prepaid basis, despite a majority report made in 1934 by one of its own committees headed by Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur which urged approval of group medicine.

Lyle Thomas, Polk county legislator and field man for the Oregon State Farmers' Union, outlined the program of the National Farmers' Union before a meeting of the Salem Ministerial association at the First Presbyterian church Tuesday morning. "Cooperatives distribute ownership of property among large numbers of our people," he said, "instead of concentrating wealth in the hands of a comparatively few."

## Refuse to Load Ships for Java

Portland, Ore., Nov. 21 (AP)—Columbia river district longshoremen today announced they will refuse to load ships carrying troops or war material to Indonesia destined for use against the people there.

At the same time, these CIO union men joined other west coast affiliates in demanding the government speed up return of veterans.

The 2500 members of the district council of the International Longshoremen & Warehousemen's union will not load ships other than troop carriers "unless the government guarantee that all available ship space is being used to bring American servicemen home quickly," said Jeff Davis, president.

In a statement issued after a week-end convention in Portland, the council announced its hands-off policy in connection with Indonesia-bound ships. "Our members did not make the sacrifices which led to a 100 percent war-support record and buy bonds in order that our efforts be spent to maintain British or Dutch supremacy over their past colonial empires or the continued enslavement and exploitation of other peoples," the statement said.

R. S. Keene, Willamette university physical education director and head coach for many years prior to entering the navy as a lieutenant commander, has returned to Salem after receiving his discharge at San Francisco last Saturday. He joined Mrs. Keene and their two daughters who preceded him late in August at the Lefelie street home. No announcement has been made concerning Coach Keene's plans and a conference scheduled for this week with Dr. G. Herbert Smith, president of Willamette, has been postponed until the latter returns from New York. During Keene's absence, Prof. Leslie Sparks has been acting physical director.

## Small Family Dinner At White House

Washington, Nov. 21 (AP)—A small family dinner will mark tomorrow's Thanksgiving observance at the White House. A presidential secretary said sitting down to turkey with the president, his wife and daughter, will be Mrs. Truman's mother, Mrs. David Wallace of Independence, Mo., her brother, Frank Wallace, Mrs. Frank Wallace and their two children, also of Independence.

## Bakers Strike Hits Grocers

San Francisco, Nov. 20 (AP)—The 82 Safeway grocery stores in San Francisco were closed today as AFL Bakery Wagon Drivers picketed the stores and clerks refused to pass the picket lines.

It was the first move in that direction to come from the 11-day-old tieup of major baking plants here.

Milton Maxwell, head of the AFL Butchers' union, said members of that union would not cross the picket lines but that they would remove perishable meats to storage if asked to do so.

Last night a general walkout in grocery stores here was averted as employers approved a pay agreement granting clerks \$43 for a 40-hour week. They had been getting \$40 for a 48-hour week.

The bakery drivers are demanding \$70 a week. Employers have insisted they would not modify their \$60 offer. The drivers now get \$54.30.

Wendell Phillips, secretary of the drivers' union, declared the picket lines were posted on the grounds Safeway had "locked out" the drivers by refusing to permit them to deliver bread to the 82 San Francisco Safeway chain stores.

Claude Jinkerson, secretary of the Retail Grocery Clerks' union, said none of the union's 450 Safeway employees would go to work.

Picketts said produce truck drivers, arriving today with Thanksgiving supplies, refused to deliver the goods.

## Plan to Enjoin Parking Meters

As soon as Mayor I. M. Doughton and City Recorder Alfred Mundt are ready to sign contracts with Michael Bronze Art company for trial installation of parking meters in Salem an injunction suit to block execution of the contract will be filed by persons opposing the meters.

Chris J. Kowitz, who has been retained as attorney by the opposition, said today he was not ready to say who would appear as plaintiff in the suit, but that it would be one taxpayer representing the Salem Retail Trade bureau which has been active in opposing meters in Salem.

The contract, which differed in terms in some respect from terms set out in the city council resolution, has not yet been returned from the company's headquarters at Covington, Ky., but is expected daily.

One difference was that the resolution called for installation of the meters within 65 days after signing of the contract, while the company terms were 75 days after receipt of contract by the company.

## Relief Supplies Alleged Sold

Washington, Nov. 21 (AP)—Two senators asserted that some foreign nations had been selling United Nations relief supplies for the benefit of their own governments.

The charges were made by Senators Elmer Thomas (D., Okla.) and McKellar (D., Tenn.) after a senate appropriations subcommittee completed closed hearings on a bill appropriating an additional \$550,000,000 for the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration.

Thomas told reporters testimony showed that the Greek government sold 7,000 UNRRA mules to farmers and "then used the proceeds to improve the agricultural program in that country."

McKellar said that UNRRA was "turning over food supplies to these governments and they are selling supplies for their own currency."

"I want to find some way to stop that," said McKellar. He did not name the governments he said were selling the food supplies.

Rev. Fedje, who has 64 Methodist churches under his jurisdiction, came to Salem recently after serving for six years as pastor of the First Methodist church at Astoria and prior to that in Hood River. He succeeded Dr. J. Edgar Purdy.

## Gen. Alex Patch Ill With Pneumonia

San Antonio, Texas, Nov. 21 (AP)—Lt. Gen. Alexander M. Patch, Jr., commander of fourth army headquarters, is seriously ill with pneumonia in Brooke General hospital here.

Brig. Gen. George C. Beach, commanding general of Brooke hospital center said Patch was admitted to the hospital Nov. 14 and that "his condition is considered very serious."

## Union Voice in Price Fixing

Washington, Nov. 20 (AP)—labor-management conference committee today studied suggestions that unions have a voice in the pricing of products and location of new plants.

The committee on management's right to manage was seeking to determine whether such innovations were feasible and whether they would contribute to better industry-labor relations.

Those were among the 35 or 40 issues still facing this one committee alone. An employer member said the questions reflected the scope of the many tough problems being threshed out by the three-week-old conference.

Despite the complex job ahead, two spokesmen predicted that the conference called by President Truman to minimize industrial strife would come up with a procedural formula that will help achieve the goal.

The optimistic forecasts came from President Eric Johnston of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce and Conference Secretary George W. Taylor.

Johnston disclosed that he had organized the conference "big six" into a steering committee to see that the other committees do not become hopelessly deadlocked on any issue.

## Ducks Fail to Stop Over in Valley

Portland, Nov. 20 (AP)—Portland nirmonds complained bitterly today that the record duck migration wasn't making stopovers here.

Officials of Ducks Unlimited announced ten days ago that the duck flight leaving Canada for the south was the largest in a decade. But sportsmen here still come home empty handed.

Frank B. Wire, state game supervisor, said ducks were skipping Oregon because the meals aren't good, and flying on down to California rice fields.
