Hospital Plan Is Presented

Mt. Angel—The community heard Dr. Michael Shadid speak on cooperative hospital at a mass meeting held here this week. Dr. Shadid organized the first cooperative hospital in North America at Elk City, Okla. and since then others have been patterned similar to his.

Frank Hettwer, manager of the Mt. Angel Cooperative creamery was chairman and briefly explained what had been done locally, at meetings of a committee appointed several years ago, who drew up a constitution and by-laws. Fr. John Cumlisky made a trip to Elk City, where he studied that cooperative hospital and came back enthused with the setup. Dr. Shadid came with Harley Libby of Salem where Libby is on the board of the Health Center being organized there known as the Farmers Union Health association.

Father Damiran pastor of Mt. Angel, suggested that the committee on organization meet with Dr. Shadid while he is in this section to hear more details of how the hospital may be organized. If the setup does not meet with the approval of the community he suggested that the community should go 100 per cent for the health center in Salem.

Libby who expected to begin soliciting memberships at \$50 each for the health center at Salem said that he and his solicitors would wait decision on the local hospital plan.
