A new spray has been developed which kills weeds among vegetables at a cost of less than \$12 per acre, as compared with about \$80 for hand-pulling.



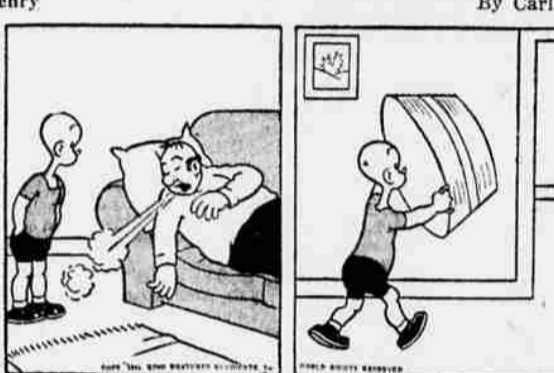

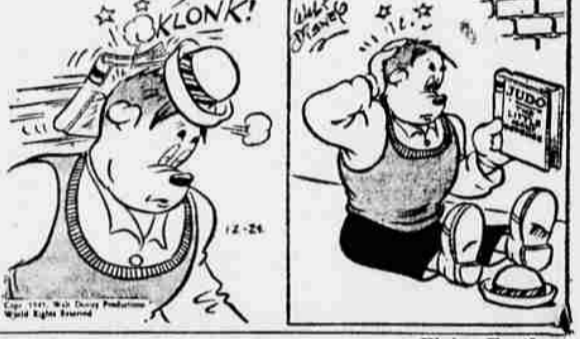
