Mennonites Planning Home For Old People at Albany

Efforts of the mission board of the Pacific district to obtain sufficient funds to assure the construction of the proposed Mennonite old people's home near Albany are meeting with success and it is hoped that work can start about April.

Seven acres for a site three and a half miles southeast of Albany donated by Oliver Schumacher were recently accepted at a meeting of the old people's home committee, the district building committee and the district mission board.

The proposed structure will cost approximately \$35,000, of which all but \$14,000 has been

raised. One third the amount was contributed by one church and more than \$10,000 subscribed by the other 15 churches in the district. No part of the required amount will be expended until the total funds needed are available, according to a decision of the board. This will be the only Mennonite home of its kind west of Illinois. The main building will be U-shaped with a capacity of 24 persons. A group of cabins to accommodate 26 or more persons will also be erected. The main structure will include a reception room, assembly hall and a dining room with accommodations for 50 or more persons and for the working staff of the home.

West Salem Council Clears Path for More Industries

West Salem, Jan. 8—The location of two more industries in the city was made possible last evening by the city council, when it authorized the sale of a six-acre tract, fronting on Wallace road, to the Farmers Union Co-operative; and a two-acre tract to J. A. Sholseth. The construction of a warehouse, store, and state office is planned by the Farmers' Union, while Sholseth expects to build a grain warehouse.

Sale price of both plots was quoted at \$800 per acre. The city reserved a 75x75 ft. tract at the location of well No. 3 and a 100x100 ft. tract at the location of the new well, which is now in process of being drilled by the Jensen company of Portland. The well, of 16 inch dimension, is sunk at present to a depth of 35 feet. It is estimated that steady employment will be available for 2500 persons within the city through the medium of the industries already in existence and those under construction in the Churchmere addition.

Railroad Is Thanked
Mayor Guy Newgent asked that the council pass a resolution expressing the city's appreciation to the Southern Pacific Railroad company for the emergency shuttle train service inaugurated during the flood for the benefit of West Salem's working public. Councilmen approved the mayor's suggestion and the recorder was instructed to send to the company a copy of the city's resolution.

The street committee was given the task of planning the location and grade of a sewer to the Oregon Textile company's plant, which will be constructed by the company with the provision that the city will provide reimbursement when it becomes necessary for an extension of the line further into the new industrial district. Also assigned to the street committee was the authority to instruct the P.G.E. and Salem Electric as to placement of poles on Seventh street between Patterson street and Wallace road. Franchises Considered

Two matters regarding franchises were given consideration by the council, namely: Ed Gardner was granted the privilege of transferring his sanitary service franchise to the new owners, Willett & Arndt; and Wesley Jones was given a ten year franchise to operate a taxi service within the city. Before the ordinance covering the franchise rights was passed upon the third reading, the word "exclusive" right was stricken from the ordinance. The councilmen were hand-

Linn Highway Damages Great

Albany, Ore.—It will require \$50,000 or more to repair damage to Linn county roads as a result of high water during the flood period last week, but several times that amount must be expended if further damage from similar causes is to be curtailed, County Engineer Walter Larsen said this week.

The flood cut away stream banks, particularly along the South Santiam bottom just east of Lebanon, the engineer said, imposing serious threats at other points and rendering extensive revetment work imperative. Adequate bank protection will cost much more than the taxpayers of Linn county alone can well afford, the engineer pointed out, and it is probable that federal aid will be necessary.

Unless the south bank of the river above Lebanon is curbed, the engineer said, the town itself will be endangered by future floods for it is quite possible that the Santiam may in time cut a new channel leading directly through the town.

All the county can do at present, in Larson's opinion, is to reroute the river road which was washed out at the danger point, located below the Albany canal dam.

Fortunately, said the engineer, the county suffered no bridge losses, but damage to roadbeds and culverts was extensive.
