Armstrong Back

Returned to Salem after an absence of almost four years, during which time he was serving with Uncle Sam's navy is Lt. (p.g.) Paul Armstrong, on terminal leave until February 5, when he reverts to inactive status.

The navy man enlisted in that branch of the armed forces in February, 1942, as an apprentice seaman and in November, 1942, received his commission under the navy V-12 program. On sea duty for 25 months in the South Pacific, he spent all of that time on the Battleship Massachusetts and took part in all of the major operations of the Third and Fifth fleets.

A gunnery officer during the first seven months that he was on the Massachusetts, Armstrong during the rest of the time that he was aboard that battleship was a communications officer. At the end of the battle for Okinawa he was removed from the ship because of a back injury and sent to the hospital at Seattle. From there he was transferred to the naval hospital at Sun Valley, where December 15, he was granted his terminal leave.

The lieutenant, who prior to enlisting in the navy was connected with the Billings and Armstrong school of dance here and who the last of this month plans to open a dancing school in Salem, wears the Asiatic-Pacific theater ribbon with five battle stars, the Philippine Liberation ribbon with two battle stars, and the American Theater ribbon.

Col. Spauer Returns

On terminal leave until May 9, Col. George Spauer, veteran of over five years of service with the army engineers has returned to Salem.

The colonel, who entered the army in October, 1940, and a year and a half ago left for duty in the Pacific, returned to the States from occupational duty in Japan, where he was assistant engineer for the Ninth corps. Before being sent to Japan he was on duty in the Philippines.

Arriving in the States December 24, the officer returned to Salem last week after being granted his terminal leave. An employee of the state forestry department prior to reporting for duty with the armed forces, Col. Spauer will return to the employ of that state department.

Mrs. Spauer has been making her home in Salem at 2110 Chemeketa street while her husband was in the service.

Olsen, an army man was wounded in action in Germany, December 10, 1944. He remained in the European theater until late in 1945. Docking in the States about the first of this year the former Salemite arrived on the west coast last week and last Saturday received his discharge from the army.

Many Sign For Duty With the U.S. Navy

Since the first of the year over 30 applications for two-year enlistments in the navy have been received at the Salem naval recruiting station and to date 21 new men have been enlisted and sent to the naval training station at San Diego for recruit training.

During the past week six men from this area have enlisted in that branch of the armed forces. Three were from Silverton and one each from Salem, McCoy and Dallas.

The men, all of whom were given the rating of apprentice seamen were John Walter Hall of 280 North 23rd street, Salem; Loyd Edward Shackelford, Oscar Paul Bolliger, Jr., and Ralph Wilbur Steffen, all of Silverton; Norman Earl Zunk of McCoy; and Kenneth Herman Kahler of Dallas.

Enlistments are now open in all branches of the navy to all ex-servicemen, including navy, marines and army, and upon enlisting they will be given the rating of seaman first class.

Navy Man Visits

Regular navy man since December, 1939, when he enlisted in that branch of the armed forces, Chief Electrician's Mate Dale Smith recently visited in Salem with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Don C. Smith, Sr.

A graduate of Salem high school and a former Willamette university student, the navy chief has been on active submarine service since the beginning of the war and was assigned to duty aboard the Blueback, on the new submarines. He was gone from the States a year on his last tour of duty.

During the time that he was in the Pacific, the Salemite was in the Java Sea, at Alaska and in the Philippines. He wears the submarine combat insignia for four successful years, the American Defense ribbon with one battle star, the Asiatic-Pacific theater ribbon with two battle stars, the Philippine Liberation ribbon with one battle star, the Good Conduct medal and the Victory ribbon.

The navy man, who was accompanied to Salem by his wife, the former Margaret Sorahan, and the couple's two children, Linda Dale and Steven, plans to remain in the service.

Also on duty in this war and now discharged is a brother of Chief Smith, Don C. Smith, Jr., who as a first lieutenant in the signal corps, saw service in North Africa, Italy, France and Germany with the 12th army. The former signal corps man is now in Los Angeles, where he is attending the University of Southern California.
