

New Buildings Lebanon Soon

Lebanon—Activity in business continues to be lively here with plans announced this week for erection of one new structure, expensive remodeling of another and good progress being made on a third.

The new building is being constructed by Vern Reeves on the former William Ellis property on Main street. George Harden was awarded the contract, and work was started Monday. The residence is being moved to the rear of the lot and a 34x30 foot building of concrete and tile with plate glass front, will be erected. Cost was estimated at \$4000 and Reeves said the building would be completed in six to eight weeks. It is designed to accommodate the Reeves Insurance business and offices for John Zimbrick.

Bert Cotton, owner of the building occupied by Western Auto is extending the structure 108 feet back to the alley. Costing around \$3500, the addition will be made as soon as possible and will increase sales room space and provide ample storage quarters.

The new Lee Scott building at 170 Oak street, started two weeks ago, is well underway. Measuring 40x60 feet, the lower floor will be used for a plumbing shop and display rooms while the second story will be an apartment. Completion is expected within 60 days.
