

Stayton School Survey Need Before Problems are Solved

Stayton—An intensive survey of the school financial and housing situation in Stayton school district, No. 77, and outlying districts sending their pupils to the Stayton schools, is the recommendation made by Dr. C. L. Huffaker, with the bureau of research in the school of education at the University of Oregon, as the preliminary step to take in approaching a new building problem in this district.

The speaker explained at a meeting sponsored by the PTA that lack of sufficient financial support and insufficient housing are the two most common troubles facing schools. It has been observed by the university man that districts operating with a large number of tuition

students, sooner or later, get to the point where they can no longer carry the load. Dr. Huffaker suggested three types of school systems which might be feasible in the district. First, district consolidation, desirable but hard to obtain; second is the union high school district, easier to get established but somewhat of an educational drawback, as grade and high schools are operated separately; lastly, application might be made through the proposed rural school support bill, which will be on the ballot at the state election.

Oregon is entering the greatest construction boom in the state's history, John W. Kelly, executive director of the postwar readjustment and development commission, said today in a report to Governor Earl Snell. Kelly said the boom will continue for five years if construction is not curtailed by labor difficulties, high prices of materials, or skyrocketing building costs.

Tax Collections Made by Sheriff

Albany—Of the total Linn county tax levy for all county funds for which levies were made this year, \$863,519.60 or all but \$194,713.27 was collected during the first half of the year, according to the semi-annual report of Sheriff H. A. Southard. These totals existed after deductions of rebates. The collections, however, included \$38,468.83 in delinquent taxes thus leaving actually \$233,182.10 of the 1945-56 tax yet unpaid.

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be one of the biggest factors in the predicted building boom, Kelly said. A minimum of 15,000 selling at \$6,500 a unit, representing a total of \$100,000,000, would scarcely satisfy the demands in one year, Kelly asserted.

Roads Have Good Start

Ship repairs, new ship construction, expansion of harbor facilities and other marine industries can be expected in Portland and the Columbia river. Moorage facilities at Tongue Point will have to be greatly increased to handle the 514 naval vessels that will be moored there, Kelly said.

The Oregon state highway commission has a good start in its \$36,000,000 three-year postwar construction program, and the state board of control is advancing in its plans for \$10,000,000 worth of construction at state institutions.

Flood control alone will cost \$3,262,000. The flood control program calls for the construction of several dams. Irrigation projects will use several more millions.

Construction of facilities for tourist trade is another item not to be overlooked, said Kelly. One oil company will spend \$500,000 establishing new service stations in the state, while nearly every hotel is planning new construction, remodeling or refurbishing to accommodate the flock of tourists who will spend probably \$100,000,000, Kelly said.
