

Woodburn Now Headquarters For Farmers' Fire Relief

Woodburn—At the 50th annual meeting of the Farmers' Fire Relief Association of Butteville, which was held at Donald, a resolution was adopted to change the principal office and place of business to Woodburn. It was the opinion of a considerable majority of those present that, as Donald has no banking facilities and the postoffice there receives its mail through rural carrier from the office at Aurora and also has unsatisfactory telephone service, the association's 8000 members would be greatly benefited if the offices were located in a town having such facilities.

Temporary quarters will be located in the former ration board headquarters in the city hall at Woodburn and at a later date the association will build on its Cleveland street property located between Front and First streets.
