Damage Suits Are Launched

Albany—Six damage suits growing out of four traffic accidents were filed Thursday in circuit court here, one suit involving a death claim and the remainder personal injury claims, all totaling \$56,886.

Beulah Rice, administratrix of the estate of Clarice Wood, asks \$10,000 for the death of Miss Woods, her daughter, allegedly as the result of injuries she sustained when a car belonging to Thomas Philpot was struck by a logging truck driven by Arden K. Weaver, November 17, 1945, on the Brownsville-Sweet Home road.

Miss Woods, the complainant, died December 21. The plaintiff charges the defendant, Weaver, with negligence and intoxication.

Vera Cox asks \$25,000 for injuries she alleges she received when a car owned by her husband, Vernon Cox, and driven by Edna Norquist, her sister-in-law, was struck by a car driven by Raymond Derrick, defendant, on the Sweet Home-Lebanon road November 11, 1945.

Glady Woodcock is suing Mrs. C. O. Totten and Harold M. Wood for \$5,000 to cover injuries she alleges she received when the defendants stopped their cars abreast on the Lyon street ramp in Albany December 19, 1945, causing the car in which she was a passenger to collide with them.

Blanche Gull is named defendant in three suits as the result of a head-on collision on the Pacific highway near Tower Grove December 1, 1945, when a car driven by the defendant allegedly collided with a car driven by Arthur D. Kent in which the three plaintiffs were passengers.

Mary Osburn asks a judgment for \$7,500, Martha Kent for \$7,888 and Pernal Osborn for \$1,500.

Criders Back from Mexico Jaunt

Dallas—Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Crider and daughter, Miss Jane Crider, have returned to Dallas from a month's trip south, which included a tour by air through Mexico.

The Mexican plane tour took them from Los Angeles, Calif., through Mexico, with the southernmost point visited about 500 miles south of Mexico City. Much of their time was spent in and near Mexico City.

Crider, owner of Crider's department store, states that consumer goods shortages prevalent here are not evident in Mexico. Prices, uncontrolled by ceilings, are high on U. S. goods, but Mexican produce and materials are reasonably priced.

Marquam Aid Supper Returns

Silverton—Members of the Marquam Methodist Ladies' Aid society are announcing their annual hot tamale supper for Thursday, February 7, at the Marquam church hall.

The hostesses will begin serving supper at 6:30 o'clock, after which a program will be given.

All members of the society are working under the supervision of Mrs. J. L. Jones, president; Miss Edith Stetson, vice president, and Miss Pauline Swartout, secretary.

This annual event of the small community has grown in popularity through the past 20 years since the English wife of the Rev. Hocking, their pastor, was responsible for the first tamale supper, using a recipe for the tamales brought with her from her native land.

Since that time the Marquam women have followed the same recipe and have never lacked for customers. Forty chickens already have been donated, as reported Thursday morning, and several more are to be given in addition. The women furnish all ingredients, practically all home-made; grow their own corn for wrappings; will consider only a certain grind of corn meal, and the meat in the tamales can be relied on as home-raised chickens.

The Silverton public, as well as folk from other valley towns, have attended these unusual suppers for years and promise to do so this year.
