

Polk County Farm Programs Are Presented at Conference

Dallas—Gearing Polk county agriculture to peace-time production and planning an over-all up-to-date farming program best suited to the resources of the county was largely accomplished at the farm program conference held at Dallas. More than 300 people crowded into the circuit court room in the courthouse for the meeting, which was one of the largest ever held in the county.

The Farm Crops committee recommended that a county-wide meeting of vetch and pea growers be held immediately, and the acreage of crops to be dusted in the county be pooled and contracts made with one or more responsible airplane concerns to apply the dust.

Farm housing, both new construction and remodeling, will become a major farm consideration in the next few years and an effort will be made to acquaint farmers with new developments in housing and in housing equipment on this account.

The dairy committee recommended that artificial insemination associations should be developed, especially for the small dairy herds in which maintaining high-priced dairy sires is impractical.

Poultry and turkey production are at an all-time high, and probably cannot be maintained on the domestic market of this country only, hence a reduction in production was recommended.

More prunes can be planted in Polk county, according to the market outlook, however no new plantings should be made except where soils are of sufficient depth, drainage and fertility.

The land use committee made many suggestions and recommendations relative to the disposal and ultimate use of Camp Adair as a farming area again. The weed menace, danger from explosives, and other damage to the area were cited.

It was pointed out by the veterans advisory committee that veterans wishing to farm in this county have available the advice and assistance of some of the most successful farmers in the county, and of farmers in practically every type of production at their disposal. Veterans should contact the county agent's office for assistance of this committee, in case they are newcomers and wish to enter the farming business here.

The farm labor committee was pessimistic in the outlook for the supply of farm labor for 1946 to the extent that this year may be worse even than any of the war years from the farm labor supply viewpoint.

Nearly every commodity committee recognized the importance of 4-H club work to the extent that farmers and others who can should act as leaders and increase the number of 4-H club members in the county by a considerable degree. It is estimated that there are 3200 boys and girls of 4-H club age in the county, and that from 800 to 1000 of these should be enrolled in club work.

Miss Frances Clinton and Charles Smith of the Oregon State College Extension service also participated in the program.

Approximately 85 farmers in the county served on these nine committees and devoted about two months to studying and developing the reports presented. Reports of the various committees were given by committee members as follows:

Flood Control Problems Aired

Lebanon—Sixty Linn county residents interested in flood control and representative of their communities gathered to discuss flood control problems and to hear Mark Nelson, Portland, engineer with the U. S. corps of engineers explain Willamette Valley flood control measures now being planned.

The group went on record favoring a movement to obtain federal funds to repair the damaged levee wall at the bend of the South Santiam southeast of Lebanon, as it appears, from available information, this is the only relief work for which congress has allotted funds.

The delegation went on record also as strongly favoring flood control in general and taking whatever measures are possible to relieve the farmers in the Sanderson bridge area, where the river is threatening to cut a new channel. This information, together with the signatures of all present will be sent to the army engineers and to the congressional representatives from Oregon.

Mayor Peter T. Tweed's motion that preference be given a program of "multiple" dams over a single flood control dam at Waterloo was voted down by an 18 to 17 count, although it is understood that the vote was in no way indicative of the sentiments in the county either in favor or against. Mayor Tweed said Lebanon folks expressed a fear that an earth fill dam so close to the city might endanger the town at some future date. Nelson stated his personal opinion that such an earth fill dam, protected with concrete at the point of greatest water pressure at the spillway, would in no way present a hazard, and the possibilities of it breaking were nil.

Also speaking briefly from the engineering side were Ivan Oakes, engineer with the Willamette Valley Basin commission, and Jack Bartlett, consultant engineer of post war readjustment development committee, both of Salem and employed by the state.

Floyd Mullens, chairman of the Linn county projects development committee, presided and called for an introduction of the delegates present, representing Sweet Home, Lebanon, Albany, Scio, and the several communities which lie along the Santiam river.

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School Board Given Program

Dallas—A long range plan for expansion of high school facilities was presented by representatives of Carl B. Fenton Post No. 20, American Legion, at the Dallas district school board meeting.
