Stanton—Members of the Lions club voted to endorse a proposal recently made by the Springfield Chamber of Commerce to establish a Cascade highway improvement association with a membership to be drawn from towns along the route including Oregon City, Silverton, Stayton, Seio, Lebanon and Springfield.

The club secretary was instructed to inform Springfield by letter that the proposed organization had met with considerable favor here with an added suggestion that an organization meeting be held in Lebanon as a favorable location for the meeting.

The meeting was referred to as "local issue night" and members came with suggestions concerning the town's betterment. Among items mentioned were the need of better street lighting, installation of sewage system and removal of power poles to alley lines.

The club voted to erect a sign at the intersection of Third and Washington streets pointing the way to the city center. It was pointed out that travelers often are unaware of where the business district is located. The group also approved of replacing the "Entering Stanton" sign at the north city limits which was displaced by vandals, also to paint a similar sign at the east entrance.

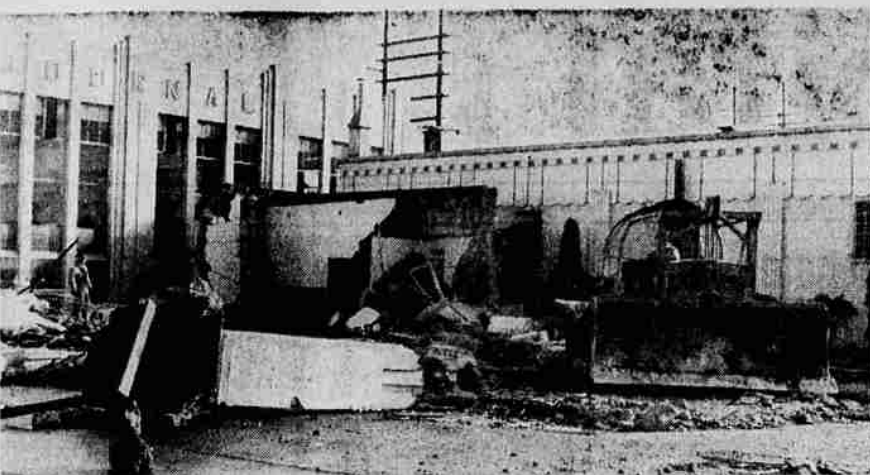
Quilters Spend Day
