Armory Would Solve Problem

Lebanon—Mayor Tweed's announcement that Lebanon is in line for a new armory, if the voters of the state approve a two percent tax in the fall election, came as a revelation to the supporters of a community center, since an armory would solve in a measure, the current problem of housing for major civic activities and open the way for the proposed youth center.

The mayor stated that national guard state officers recently visited here and reported that Lebanon is considered for an expenditure of approximately \$125,000 for an armory, if the appropriation is voted. The city could add to the building any money of its own that it desired in enlarging the structure, or providing additional facilities. A combination heating plant to serve a swimming pool would likewise be permitted. The city's preliminary drafts for a civic center would necessarily be altered, as the veterans' memorial building, for which \$14,000 has already been collected in donations, would probably be consolidated with the armory.

Tweed added that a move for the construction of a swimming pool would be started shortly, but that plans were as yet indefinite. He said bids for a pool were called last fall, but all were too high. The plans, he said, now have to be altered to provide a less expensively designed pool.
