Books not desired are translations, wild west stories, juveniles, encyclopedias or text books. English is now taught in the elementary schools in the large cities of Russia and libraries have waiting lists of from six to eight months long for English books.

The box in which the books may be placed is by the cloak room just at the entrance to the library. The book plates on which the donor may write his or her name, are on the table near the book box.
