

Farmers' Union Cooperative Warehouse Program Outlined

Dallas—At the annual all-day meeting in the Chamber of Commerce rooms of the Farmers Union Cooperative warehouse, M. M. Gillis, manager of the warehouse, gave details of the organization's contemplated building program, and discussed difficulties confronting the farmers and the warehouse business.

The new grain elevator, planned by the group will have storage capacity of 90,000 bushels. As the first modern elevator in the Willamette valley, it will have dump scales and automatic loading-out scales, which will result in savings in labor costs at the warehouse and to

patrons bringing in grain. From the scales the grain will be dumped directly into a pit and be elevated to the proper bin in the 101 feet high structure.

Storage room in the elevator will be 42x57 feet and the enclosed scale room will be 18x30 feet, making total dimensions 60x57 feet. The building, which will be constructed of laminated wood, will be built by the A. S. Fetterman company of Spokane at a cost of about \$40,000, including equipment.

The warehouse will find it increasingly difficult to supply farmers with poultry feed, Gilles said, because of the reduction of wheat supply. Reducing the wheat content in poultry feed causes a drop in egg production.

Following the manager's report, the members passed a resolution asking relief for the Northwest on the government's wheat regulation.

Stating that radical changes in farming are to be anticipated, W. C. Leth, county agent addressed the organization on new methods to be used by agriculturists, such as airplane dusting of seed crops.

The financial report prepared and presented by C. L. Kelley of Eugene, auditor, showed total seeds and grains received from growers for 1945 of 12,448,261 as against the previous year's 11,396,584. Sales of grain and merchandise for 1945 was \$631,976.31, the highest in the history of the warehouse. The payroll showed a \$3500 boost over the previous year, with a total of \$56,396.82 for the year.

Joe Harland, president, commented the organizational ability of the founders of the warehouse, and praised patrons and employees for their loyalty, in his report.

Harland, Ross Simpson and Frank Neufeld were all reelected to the board of directors.

Moving From Albany Costly to College

Albany, Ore., (AP)—Additional terms of the will of the late S. G. Talia, who left all his money to the Shrine hospital in Portland, were revealed when the estate was entered for probating.

The will showed that Albany college, which now is known as Lewis & Clark college in Portland, sacrificed a sizeable scholarship by moving from this city.

The will instructs the executor, designated as the United States National Bank of Portland, to disallow any claim on the estate that might be made by the college trustees of . . . "for the reason that the college violated terms of my . . . written promise of a scholarship by moving the school from Albany."

Stayton Electrician Gets Electric Burns

Mill City—Byron B. Schucks, of the Shux Electric company in Stayton, was seriously burned while working at the Mill City Manufacturing company mill when he accidentally took hold of a second live wire. The shock rendered him unconscious and he fell from a cross arm between two poles, thus pulling him away from the current. His fall of nine or ten feet was broken by Charles Gentry who was working near by. Schucks' hands were both burned badly in the palms, however he suffered no other injuries other than strain.
