# Social Club Plans Dance

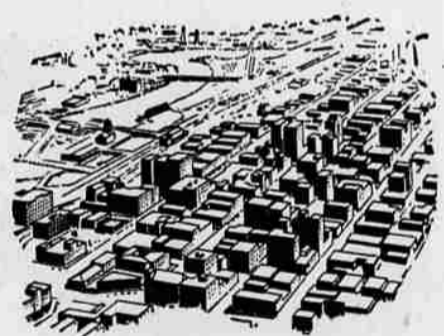
Plans are in full swing for the St. Patrick's dance recreation club, to be given at the Veterans hall Friday at 8:30 o'clock.

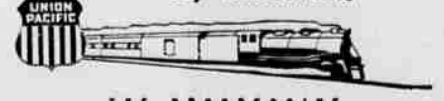

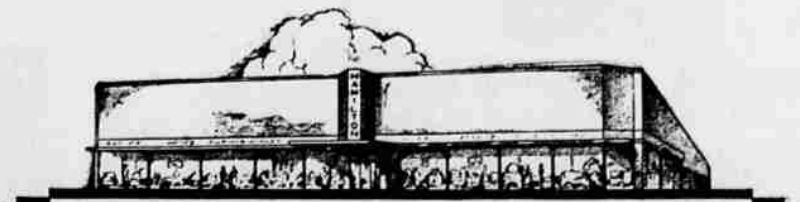
