Patton's Honor Guardsman Home

With the Third army of the late Gen. Patton the entire time that he saw combat duty in the European theater and an honor guard at Patton's funeral, Pvt. Kenneth Brown, this week returned to Salem following receipt of his discharge from the armed forces of this country, March 17.

Entering the army in the summer of 1943 after completing his freshman year at Willamette university the soldier received his basic training at Camp Fannin, Texas, from which place he was sent to the University of Nevada with the ASTP.

With the discontinuance of the ASTP program Brown was sent to Camp Cooke, Calif., as a replacement and there in March, 1944, joined the 11th armored division, with which he served in Europe. Shipping-out from Camp Kilmore, N. J., the Salemite's outfit arrived overseas in the summer of 1944 and trained in England until December 1944, when it left for duty on the continent.

As a rifleman with an infantry unit of the 11th armored division Brown saw service in France, Belgium, Germany, Luxembourg, Holland, Austria and Czechoslovakia and after termination of hostilities was on duty with the army of occupation, returning to the States in late winter of this year and docking in New York March 8. He wears the ETO ribbon with three battle stars, the American theater ribbon, a Presidential Unit Citation ribbon, the Good Conduct medal and the Victory Medal.

Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Brown of 991 South Liberty street, plans to continue his college education in the near future.

ers are asking a 25 cent hourly increase, 40-hour week, union shop, and checkoff, will open today.

A conference will be held here Friday and Saturday with the lumbermen's industrial relations committee, the Willamette Valley Operators' Association, and the Oregon Coast Operators' association. Meetings with the Plywood association here and the pine industrial relations committee at Klamath Falls are scheduled for March 25.
