Espee Speeds Train Service

Salem travelers will benefit by a new train to California which will sharply shorten the schedule of all passenger trains between Portland, San Francisco and Los Angeles, J. A. Ormandy, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, announced Wednesday.

The Cascade will be re-established as an all-Pullman train with lounge car and other premium facilities, while the Beaver "Twenty miles?" asked Sen. Eastland.

All of the other trains between Oregon and San Francisco and Los Angeles are being likewise expedited. The Klamath will leave Portland at 8:15 a.m. and arrive in San Francisco at 7:50 a.m., providing direct connections with the daylight

Not a State Of Bookworms

Oregon apparently is not a state of bookworms. The average Oregonian borrowed only four books from public libraries last year, according to State Librarian Eleanor Stephens, and probably all of those were not read.

In areas where county libraries function, the average reader borrows more than five books, while in areas where only independent libraries operate, the average is slightly more than two books per person.

More than half the population in areas where there are no county libraries, is entirely dependent upon the state library and book lending stores for reading material other than magazines, newspapers and catalogues, Miss Stephens said.

These facts, the librarian believes, are good arguments for increasing the number and capacity of public libraries.

Public libraries in Oregon

have shown considerable growth in the last few years, she reported. More than 1,570,698 volumes are now on public library shelves. More than 321,392 persons have library cards. Last year library circulation reached the 4,441,392 mark.
