Veterans of World War II seeking priorities for the construction of homes and those persons building living quarters for veterans have since the HH preference rating program went into effect considerable delay at times in getting started with the construction because of the length of time involved in securing the priorities.

Part of the delay can be attributed to the large number of applications received with considerable time needed to check each one. On the applicant, however, can be placed some of the blame for many fail to follow the instructions given for making the application, or do not answer all of the questions on the form.

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dwelling places for veterans the FHA has listed the items that must be included in an application for material for construction, thus making it possible to hurry the application through with very little re-checking necessary.

To receive a priority the construction cannot exceed a construction price of \$10,000, including the lot upon which it is to be built, and it must be a place of residence offered for rent or sale to a veteran of World War II or one that is being built by a World War II veteran for his occupancy. In case of construction of a dwelling by a non-veteran for the use of a veteran it must be offered to a veteran of World War II during the construction and for 30 days after completion at a sales price under \$10,000 or rental under \$80 per month per unit.

In the remodeling of existing structures, the application must show that an additional dwelling unit or units will be added and that they will be offered for rent to veterans of World War II, during construction and for 30 days after completion. On these, too, the rental cannot exceed \$80 per month per unit.

Applications are made on two forms, CPA 4386 (triplicate copies) and CPA 4386-A for new construction only, both of which come in three copies and are secured at the FHA office in the Platt building in Portland or from any selective service board. In addition to the information contained in these forms floor plans of the completed structure, showing complete over-all dimensions and a front view of the complete structure, showing the elevation of the lot and height dimensions of the structure must be submitted. The floor plan of the basement does not have to be included, but plans of all of the other floors must be sent in with the application.

Description of the property must be complete enough that it can be easily located. If it is in the country, where there are no street, lot or block numbers, the applicant should state the side of the road upon which it is located and give the approximate distance from the nearest cross-road.

## Lt. Bayus Inspects Salem Naval Office

At the Salem naval recruiting office last week making an inspection tour was Lt. J. E. Bayus, officer in charge of the naval recruiting station in Portland and for the state of Oregon.

The lieutenant while here stressed the importance of bringing the peacetime navy up to 500,000, this to be done through the recruiting of personnel. He also pointed out that the navy offer 55 trade schools with full-time training and that all men between the ages of 17 and 30 were given the opportunity to qualify for one of the 155 different assignments now required in manning ships.

In conclusion, the recruiting officer drew attention to the fact that all men enlisting in the navy now, after completing their enlistment period, would have an opportunity to enter college and finish their education under the GI bill of rights.
