New Sawmill For Woodburn

Woodburn—Construction of a sawmill in Woodburn is to begin at once, according to the announcement by James H. Livesay of the Livesay Lumber yard. Machinery for the mill is now being hauled in and the plant is expected to be ready for operation by the middle of May.

The mill will be located on the Charles Gates tract of land on Tootze street northeast of the lumber yard and planing mill. The sawmill will have a capacity of 10,000 feet of lumber in an 8-hour shift with two large circular saws powered by electric motors. Another planer will also be installed with a capacity of 2000 feet per hour. Logs will be purchased locally as much as possible.
