Linn Voting Strength Seen

Albany—Linn county voters of all parties total 16,469, it was stated Thursday by R. M. Russell, county clerk, when he completed tabulation of registration figures for the May 17 primaries.

This is a gain of 1037 over the registration tabulations made on May 22, 1945, but it is 394 less than the total shown on October 7, 1944, preceding the last presidential election.

The new registration shows that while republicans still dominate the county, the democrats have gained on them slightly in the last year.

Total republican registrations stand now at 8270, an increase of 473 over the total of last May. Democrats now number 7574, a gain of 599.

Registration of minor parties for this year are shown as follows: Socialists, 16; prohibitionists 21; independent 79, and miscellaneous 509.

Lebanon—Jack B. Jamieson, a resident of the Lacombe area, was severely burned as the result of a fuel oil explosion at the Snow Peak logging camp near Lacombe. Suffering from extensive first degree burns, he was removed to the Lebanon general hospital. His condition is reported as favorable.

Lebanon Boys Die in Wreck

Hillsboro, April 29 (P)—Two teen age Lebanon boys were killed and two others critically injured west of here yesterday afternoon when their auto skidded on the Wilson river highway and rolled into a canyon 400 feet below.

State Police Sgt. O. O. Nichols reported the dead were Robert E. Ackeret, 16, and Hugh Leon Logan, 18, found dead in the car when motorists reached the wreckage.

Eugene Arnold Simi, 18, was admitted to the Jones hospital here for treatment of shock and possible internal injuries, and Darrell Guinn, 17, was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital in Portland with head injuries. Both were thrown from the car in the accident, police said, and were unconscious.

Sgt. Nichols reported investigation revealed the boys had passed another auto near the summit of the mountain, swerved on hitting loose gravel, and went over the embankment and down the mountainside. Identification was delayed because papers and other belongings of the youths were scattered down the mountain.

The car was registered to Carl Ackeret, 340 Second St., Lebanon. Sgt. Nichols reported.
