Lebanon to Serve Paper Shortcake

Lebanon, May 1 (AP)—Plans for the 5,000 pound shortcake to be served here during the May 31-June 1 annual strawberry festival have been abandoned because of the world famine.

Festival officials report a cardboard cake—a replica of the huge shortcake served 10,000 persons in 1941—will replace the customary berry accompaniment.

The committee has advised President Truman, Secretary of Agriculture Anderson, and UNRRA Chief La Guardia the cardboard cake will save 500 pounds of sugar, 120 pounds of shortening, 160 quarts of milk, 1200 eggs, 325 pounds of flour, 18 pounds of baking powder, six quarts of flavoring, 80 pounds of cream and 1,500 pounds of decoration.
