Dallas—Purchase of the old school building in Rickreall was reported by officers of the Rickreall Grange at their last meeting, held jointly with the Falls City Grange.

Lebanon Gets Family Units

Lebanon—Relief for the local housing shortage was promised when the regional office of the federal public housing authority in Seattle announced that Lebanon had been allotted 80 family dwelling units for occupancy of veterans, servicemen and their families.

The announcement did not say when the surplus units would be moved here, but it was presumed there would be little delay. Mayor Peter Tweed reported a plat of the proposed site of the units, which is adjoining the victory homes, had been prepared by City Engineer G. E. Whitcomb and sent to the regional office, and the office had informed him a representative would call and inspect the property.

The city council had applied for 100 units.

Stamp Window Sales Point to Record

Albany—Because of a spurt in business at the Albany post office last month, stamp window receipts are now somewhat ahead of the total for the first four months of last year, Postmaster G. T. Hockensmith stated this week-end.

The postmaster reported that receipts in April totaled \$8,407.59, which is \$687.74 more than was the total for April of last year. This, he predicted, would indicate that the 1946 total may set a new all-time high mark.

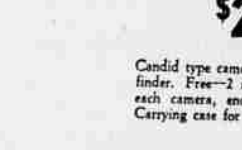

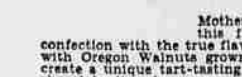
