Rose Society Giving Medals

The American Rose Society, with which the Salem Society is affiliated, has donated two medals to be awarded exhibitors at the Salem Rose show in the YMCA June 15 and 16, it was announced today by Ray Warren, chairman of the show committee.

One of these, a silver medal, will be awarded the winner in the junior division which is open to all boys and girls through high school age.

These medals will be awarded in addition to the gold trophies which are also to be presented to the winners in these two divisions, Warren said.

Three certificates will also be awarded by the American Rose society to winners in the Salem show.

One of these, a silver certificate will go to the exhibitor of the best Christopher Stone rose. A bronze certificate will be awarded the best polyantha in the show and another bronze certificate will go to the exhibitor of the best climbing rose.

Warren reports a growing interest in the show with many amateur growers requesting copies of the premium list describing the many classifications which are available to all prospective exhibitors on request.

Increased Pay for Plywood Workers

Tacoma, June 1 (AP)—Agreements to bring to 10,000 employees in the plywood and door industry in the northwest a five cent hourly increase in wages were announced today by the plywood and door manufacturers' industrial committee.

The committee announced it had agreed on a five cent hourly increase with the plywood, box shuck and door council, district nine of the International Woodworkers' association, CIO, and the Puget Sound District Council, Lumber and Sawmill Workers, AFL.

The increase will apply in all brackets. The committee said it had submitted the agreements to a wage stabilization board for a ruling, and that the increases would, if approved, become effective retroactive to April 1 to members of both unions.

BUSES WILL SHINE WITH SAFETY FILM

Outlines of Greyhound buses will soon glow at night from reflected lights of other cars, according to the president of Pacific Greyhound Lines F. W. Ackerman.

For added safety, Greyhound will trim buses with war-developed plastic film containing thousands of microscopic glass lenses in every square inch. The Greyhound dog and designs on sides, front and rear are covered with this material. Appearance of the bus remains unchanged in daylight.

Equipping Greyhound's 4,500 buses with this safety feature will cost \$250,000, Mr. Ackerman said, and it is believed Greyhound's example will encourage other motor vehicle operators to adopt similar safety methods.

YMCA Sponsors Swim Campaign

The Salem YMCA will have its 26th annual Learn to Swim campaign this year from Monday, June 3, to Saturday, June 15, in the association swimming pool. It provides six free swimming lessons to any man, woman, boy or girl in Salem or vicinity who wishes to learn to swim. This activity is in line with a nation-wide effort on the part of the YMCA to encourage water safety and to help people to enjoy swimming as a recreation.

The schedule will have boys and men swimming on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday of the two weeks, while girls and women will be taught on Tuesday, Friday and Saturday. Periods are given to the various participants according to the following schedule:

1:00-1:45—Pupils from Bush, McKinley and Richmond schools.
1:45-2:30—Pupils from Englewood, Garfield and Washington schools.
2:30-3:15—Pupils from Grant, Highland, West Salem and St. Vincent de Paul.
3:15-4:00—Junior high and high school students.
8:00-9:00—Adults.

The lessons will be available to anyone who cannot swim 50 feet over deep water. Capable instructors are in charge.

Storage Buildings For National Guard

The buildings, to cost \$385,000, varying in size from 49 by 72 to 100 by 200 feet, would be built at Coquille, Cottage Grove, Freewater, Roseburg, Clackamas, Salem, Coos Bay, Dallas, Eugene, Oregon City, Forest Grove, Grants Pass, Hillsboro, Milwaukie, Newberg, Pendleton, St. Helens, Seaside, The Dalles and Ashland.
