Holiday Toll Of Deaths 198

(By the United Press)
The death toll for the long Memorial day holiday week-end mounted today, claiming many victims from among the tangle of pre-war automobiles on the nation's highways.

At least 198 persons were killed after the holiday began Thursday morning. Eighty-one died in traffic accidents, 59 were drowned and 59 died from other accidental causes.

Pennsylvania, with 30 persons killed, reported the largest number of fatalities. Sixteen died in traffic accidents, eight were drowned, and two were burned to death.

California reported 20 deaths, seven of which resulted from traffic accidents. Six were drownings. New York state reported 15 violent deaths, including seven suicides.

Ohio reported 13 deaths and Michigan 11. Oregon reported two dead and Washington one.

The National Safety council predicted that 98 more persons will die today and 105 tomorrow. Earlier it had predicted that the four-day toll of traffic would reach at least 329.

Arctic June In Middlewest

Shivering midwesterners dug into closets in search of topcoats today and government meteorologists said the "Arctic" June weather would continue until Tuesday.

Snow flakes fell in St. Paul during the night and freezing temperatures were recorded at several Minnesota points.

Cold, biting air extended from northern Pennsylvania westward to Nebraska, cutting across Iowa, northern Illinois, Indiana and Ohio. Temperatures held in the low and middle 40's.

Meteorologists blamed the unseasonal chill on an "unusually large and powerful cold mass" which settled over Hudson Bay and forced warmer air southward. The cold area still was moving southward and may cover all of southern Indiana and Illinois by tonight.
