

West Salem School Budget Is Placed Before Voters

West Salem, June 7—Notices were posted yesterday of the annual school meeting and the budget meeting. Monday, June 17, is the date of the annual school meeting at which time a director will be elected for a three year term. Pete Harms, chairman of the board, is the retiring director. The meeting is announced for 7 o'clock in the evening with balloting to continue for one hour.

The budget meeting is scheduled for Friday evening, June 28 at 7:30 p.m. in the upper grades building. The budget committee, composed of Chester Douglas, chairman, Eldon Newberry, secretary, C. A. Rust and the directors recommended a budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1946, totaling \$52,795.00 which is the highest in the history of the school. Approximately \$43,000.38 of the total will be met by state school support and direct taxation.

Inclusion of funds for the extensive repair and alteration of all three buildings and equipment is a contributing factor to the vast increase in the budget. Provision was made for the employment of two additional teachers and a band director on a part time basis.

The general cost of janitor and school supplies were nearly double that of last year. The district's contribution to the teachers' retirement fund represented a \$1510 item in the budget.

When a young man he purchased land in the Grand Island and Unionvale districts and while residing at that location was united in marriage November 28, 1886, with Miss Huldah Hutchens of the Webfoot district. He sold the Grand Island-Unionvale property to Andrew Hewitt in 1899 and purchased what is now the farm of Mrs. Harvey Turner, selling it to her and her late husband in 1910.

He purchased and sold several pieces of land before purchasing a portion of his father's farm. After disposing of several parcels of the original farm there still remains more than 200 acres of which his farm is a portion.

Dorsey is the father of four children. Two are living, Mrs. Goodrich and Mrs. Clair Reid. Mrs. Dorsey died January 17, 1938. He kept a housekeeper until help shortage forced Dr. and Mrs. Orr C. Goodrich to move his home and care for him.
