Passes Needed By Fishermen

Dallas—Although official closure of the forest area in western Polk county has not been made, entry via the logging road above Black Rock is restricted to those having passes. This affects fishermen wishing to reach the upper portions of the Little Luckiamute or the branches of the Siletz.

A gate has been established at Black Rock to keep out unauthorized travelers. Permits can be secured only from Owen Boran, woods superintendent. The measure is taken solely for fire protection.

F. E. Kersey, former Dallas mayor, is keeper of the gate. He was in Dallas a few days this week, as heavy rains in the woods made the forests safe from fire for a few days.

Special Road Tax Approved for Polk

Dallas—A special road levy of \$60,000 for Polk county was approved at a taxpayers' meeting held in the county courthouse. The fund will be raised by a special tax on all property outside of the five incorporated cities of the county.

The special levy will make possible additional work this year when increasing expenses made the possible budget levy for roads inadequate for the purpose. It also simplified the matter of keeping the 1946-47 budget under the 6% limitation. The official county budget is to be published for the first time next week.
