Canning With Less Sugar on Program

Answers to canning problems and an improved technique for making sugar go farther will feature a canning and cooking school to which the public is invited Tuesday at 1:30 p.m. in the Portland Gas & Coke company Hospitality House, 109 South Commercial street.

Conducting the school will be Mrs. Vivian Freeman, Kerr Mason Jar company home canning authority, assisted by Miss Lois Heesacker of the gas company's home service staff.

Mrs. Freeman will demonstrate how five or six jars of fruit may be canned with the same amount of sugar estimated by the government as needed for four jars, and without sacrificing sweetness, her "secret" being improved canning technique.

Also on the program will be the canning of vegetables and fowl, using the pressure method. The hot water bath method will be used for fruits. Recipes for serving home canned foods also will be featured.

Fail to Report Wage Credits

Twelve persons who failed to report farm earnings while drawing unemployment benefits have been disqualified by the Oregon unemployment compensation commission and may be prosecuted, Administrator Silas Gaiser said today.

Five involve veterans who were drawing readjustment allowances under the federal law and four were against claimants who had wage credits in other states, Gaiser said.

He did not disclose their names.

Under the state law, claimants are allowed to earn \$2 a week without receiving deductions from the lowest wage bracket schedule of \$18-\$20 a week, while the federal law allows veterans to earn \$3 without having to report for weekly deductions from the low bracket of \$20 weekly, Gaiser said.

"We are making every effort to prevent payments to those with earnings or to others not entitled to benefits under the law," Gaiser declared. He added that many other cases are being investigated.

Veterans Told of Jobs in Alaska

Veterans with service experience in radio communications or clerical work may be able to qualify for new openings in Alaska just announced by the U. S. civil service commission, the Salem office of the U. S. employment service has been informed.

Men are wanted for assistant aircraft communicators and women for clerical work and applicants should be between 20 and 40 years of age and fully qualified for jobs desired. Men should have ability to operate radio and typewriter and women will be expected to be able to take dictation. Starting salaries are \$3334 and \$2377. Limited housing facilities are available.

Dr. Oliver's book, "Giving Form to Ideas," just published by the Odyssey Press, has been very favorably commented upon by educators and general readers. The book contains much material of local interest, including "The Rise of Judicial Supremacy" by Philip H. Parrish of the Oregonian and essays written in Dr. Oliver's English classes by Geraldine Schmoker, Corinne Engdahl, Kay Karnopp and Caroline Cooper.

Goode Attacks Efforts Made For Vet Housing in Salem

Notwithstanding the fact that the Salem Chamber of Commerce has taken a lead in the effort to obtain housing for veterans, the chamber and Salem business men were accused by Don Goode, contact man for the state department of veterans affairs, of "selling the veterans short."

Goode made his charge in a speech before the Salem Credit association. The Chamber of Commerce set up the original veterans' housing committee. Later, for the reason that the federal housing administration required city sponsorship, practically the same committee was reappointed by Mayor Doughton, by direction of the city council, as the Salem housing authority. This group acquired for Salem the allocation of veterans' housing units now being set up on the Klett property on South 16th street.

The Chamber of Commerce acquired, after a strenuous effort, priorities for more than a hundred homes in Salem, to be built by private persons, but with requirement that veterans be given preference either for purchase or rental of the houses.

Chamber officials were non-committal when asked for a reply to Goode's charges, but the chamber's record has been pretty well publicized.

Folger Johnson, state FHA director, said Friday that all veterans' housing priorities for western Oregon, for houses to be sold, have been exhausted until a new quota is announced July 1.

Goode declared in his talk Friday that "no civic group or organization has made an effort to establish remedies for the veterans' housing shortage comparable to the energies used to bring Camp Adair into this area for its potential profits to Salem merchants during the war."

Concerning the scarcity of materials he said, "I notice enormous amounts of lumber,
