

Satkos Head East--Still in Mood For Bit of Prospecting

Seattle, June 13 (AP)—Still in a pioneering mood, Paul Satko and his family headed east today for Arkansas, disappointed after six toll-filled Alaska years but still wanting to "prospect around a bit." The one-time unemployed Richmond, Va., machinist, who took his wife and seven children north with him in a home-made ark back in 1940, ran into some state-side problems right away.

"I'm beginning to realize you've got quite a housing shortage down here," he said. "I want to get across those mountain ranges east of here, and find me some open. Maybe there are some open spaces in Arkansas."

After all his work, the department of interior would not give him homestead rights to his hard-won land, Satko told newsmen after their arrival on the steamer North Sea.

"Somebody said it was against policy of the general land office to grant homesteads now — I don't know."

"The forest service people told congressional investigators that it cost about \$2000 an acre to clear homestead land there," he went on. "So, by the government's own estimate, I'm out \$40,000."

Mrs. Satko said she was glad to get away from the Alaska rain.

"But I'd rather have made the trip back the way we went north — in our ark," she said. "There were 48 children on the ship

coming out, and that's too many."

Satko broke in: "A single man could make a go of it in Alaska, but not one with all my dependents."

Royal Family Attend Nuptials

London, June 13 (AP)—The 32-year-old Duke of Northumberland and Lady Elizabeth Montague-Douglas-Scott, whose families were feudal enemies centuries ago, were married Wednesday in a colorful ceremony at Westminster Abbey attended by the royal family.

The bride, slim 24-year-old daughter of the Duke and Duchess of Buccleuch, is a niece of the Duchess of Gloucester and a personal friend of Princess Elizabeth.

King George and Queen Elizabeth, the two princesses and Queen Mary were present. Thousands of commoners waited outside for a glimpse.

The duke courted his Scottish bride according to the tradition of the House of Percy from which he sprang. His ancestral domain is Northumberland, an English dukedom on the Scottish border.

From there, mounted on a black horse, he rode 100 miles to Drumlanrig castle in Dumfriesshire, Scotland—to ask her hand in marriage. His ancestors traveled the same route in the 16th century in a border foray against his bride's people, whose names are legend in the history of Scotland.

In addition to the five beautiful gold trophies being offered as grand and sweepstakes prizes there will be valuable merchandise prizes and ribbons for the winners in each of more than 50 classifications in the show.

The show will remain open through Sunday and all rose lovers are invited to attend and inspect the blooms. There will be no admission charge.
