

Street Improvement Program Launched

Scio—At the June meeting of Scio city council plans were made to improve Main, Mill, Smith and North streets, together with Wheeler street from Mill to North street, running north and south between the Scio school buildings. Surveying, grading and extending South Mill street to the new residence of H. L. Larimer also were tentatively arranged.

Plans were furthered to drill a third well in the hope of increasing water supply for the city system, well No. 1, in use for several years, having become useless by recurring caving.

Council approved city budget providing \$2650 for running expenses for the fiscal year July 1, 1946, to and including June 30, 1947.

Tax on punchboards in the city for the month of May was reported by the recorder as \$93.50. Bills allowed included \$93 to Police Officer Melvin and \$51 for painting railings on the foot bridges on Thomas creek.
