

Independence Council Lets Street Paving Contract

Independence—Contract for the paving of 34 blocks of city streets in Independence was awarded by the city council to the Warren Northwest, Inc., on a bid of \$75,640 as opened at the previous meeting. The only other bidder for the job was the United Contractors whose bid was for \$80,460.

Kirsch Heads Woodburn Post

Woodburn—Joe M. Kirsch was elected commander of Woodburn post No. 46 of the American Legion, at the annual election held Wednesday night. Adrian Schooler was elected first vice commander; Dr. Delbert Reed, second vice commander and Milton Coy, adjutant. The executive committee is Harold Ingram, E. J. Hughes and John Hanrahan. Appointive officers have not been announced.

Installation will be held the second Wednesday in September. The next regular meeting will be July 10.

Delegates elected to the convention in Portland July 15, 16 and 17 are Harold H. Henry, Milton Coy, Joe Kirsch, Levi Miller of Hubbard and H. F. Butterfield. Alternates Ernest M. Meyer, Floyd Maricle, John T. Stauffer of Hubbard and Joe Steiger. The post voted to pay the regular \$2 registration fee of the delegates and a fee of \$1.00 for the alternates.

Miles Austin, service chairman, was authorized to order 10 rifles for the firing squad and the squad is to be prepared for any and all calls for military services.

Refreshments were served to both the Legion and auxiliary and visitors by a committee which included Joe Kirsch, Murray Henry, Cornelius Donnelly, Herbert Gill and Paul Halter.

Lougheed Receiving Swim Instructions

Independence — Ellis Lougheed is leaving this week for Cour d'Alene, Idaho where he will spend the coming week attending aquatic and water front direction school.

While in school, he will be studying various phases of swimming instruction, life saving, canoeing, and rowing, to prepare him for sharing those duties besides being first aid supervisor during this summer session at Camp Pioneer, the Cascade area council's summer Boy Scout camp.

The course of instruction will be from June 16-22 inclusive, and the local Scout council is paying the expenses. The local Scout council is sending several young men, who will be on this summer's camp staff, to Idaho for special instruction in various fields of work prior to the opening of camp on July 7.

Work on the street improvement is to start within ten days after the contract is signed and is to be completed in 90 days. The principal streets to be improved under this contract are F street from Third to Tenth street; Seventh street from C street to the city limits and Sixth street from Monmouth to G street.

The Warren company was the only bidder on a proposed storm sewer along E street from Third street to Ash creek with laterals to intersecting streets and alleys. Their bid was for \$18,017.50 which City Engineer Ed. Himes said was approximately \$4000 above his estimate for the job. The council deferred action until the bid has been checked but agreed to meet again next week to pass on the contract so that work on the storm sewers can be completed before the new pavement is laid.

No citizen appeared at the council meeting to protest against the annual budget but the council deferred final action on this matter until after Friday's sewer bond election so that provision can be included in the budget for payment of interest if the bond issue is approved.

The council approved a bill for \$180 for the putting of the light poles in the business district and authorized the fire department to purchase a new pump for the fire truck.

Stayton Bean Festival Has Fine Prospect

Stayton—Selection of a queen and a bigger and better parade are the two main features to be revived at the first post-war Stayton bean festival July 30-August 3, festival officials announced this week.

The queen's contest and parade will be handled by the Veterans' Memorial Building association. The group selected D. George Cole, general chairman; John Christensen, parade; Harry Humphreys, queen and princesses; C. V. Johnson, Joe Spaniol, queen's ball.

Several divisions will be included in the parade. Business, civic and fraternal organizations entries from Stayton and over all the valley will be lined up soon.

L. H. Wright was elected president of the bean festival association, Angus Ware, vice president; Gill Schachtsick, secretary. Ware was also appointed chairman of the dance committee.

Independence—The Hop Bowl association, dormant since 1941, was revived at a meeting of independence business men at which Ralph Kletzing was elected president and E. P. Oppinger secretary. Directors of the revitalized organization include Wm. Darling, Tom Smith, Dr. M. J. Butler, Dan Schreiber, Robert W. Craven, Dr. C. A. Fratzke, Paul E. Robinson and Glen Smith.

At this organization meeting of the Hop Bowl association it was decided to stage a hop fiesta again this year and August 8, 9 and 10 were tentatively set as the dates for this event.

No definite arrangements have yet been made for the three day program except that it is planned to stage a parade on one of the fiesta days and the program committee has a tentative promise from the Journal Juniors that they will be here with their bands and entertainers one day.
