Silverton—Even with a request by members of the city council who have favored the move "Please give no publicity on meters," the news has definitely leaked out to the general public that the aldermen have been working on the question of placing parking meters on the streets of Silverton in the business section for at least the past five months.

Independence Plans Fiesta

Independence—The Independence hop fiesta, an annual event until the war, will be resumed this year with a three-day program of fun and entertainment scheduled for August 8, 9 and 10.

Plans for the program are in the hands of the Hop Bowl, Inc., which was reorganized at a meeting of business men at which Ralph Kletzing, publisher of the Enterprise, was elected president, and E. P. Oppinger, manager of the Western Auto Supply company store, secretary.

While program plans are still in the tentative stage it includes a parade of floats for one day and entertainment by the Oregon Journal Juniors for another day.

The date for this year's fiesta is the earliest in the history of this event but local business men preferred the date prior to the beginning of hop picking which is scheduled to get under way about August 15.

Dallas Grain Elevator Tops All Buildings

Dallas—Now at full height is the city's nearest approach to a skyscraper, the new bulk grain elevator of the Farmers Union warehouse. It towers over 130 feet in the air.

The head house, surmounting the grain bins, was erected this week and roofing has been completed. Workmen are now installing corrugated aluminum siding on the sheer perpendicular walls.

M. M. Gilles, manager of the warehouse, has hopes that the entire job will be completed by the end of the month. Some machinery has been received and the remainder is expected soon. The fall should see the elevator with filling bins.

The structure has a capacity of 110,000 bushels.

Queen Coronation Plans Completed

Albany—Definite plans for the coronation of the Albany Timber carnival queen the evening of July 2 on Waverly lake were set and details of the ceremony and ball to follow were made at a meeting here last week.

Announcement of who will be queen will be made the afternoon of July 2 downtown. Gifts will be presented then also. At the lake a pageant of color, costumes and lighting will be held. Coronation ceremonies and a special command performance by dancers, singers and instrumentalists will take place on a float.

Old English court costumes will be worn by the attendants at the coronation, while the queen and her attendants will wear special gowns of a pastel shade.

Veterans Get Living Units

Lebanon—Representatives of the federal public housing authority conferred with city officials in regard to the 60 surplus living units the FPHA is moving to Lebanon for rental to veterans, service men and their families. A contract was drawn up for consideration of the city council.

The project will consist of nine roll houses, three of which will contain four living units, and six will contain eight units. Each unit has from two to three bedrooms, and is equipped with a wood range, space stoves and ice box. The rent will be established on the basis of rent levels charged here by private parties for accommodations of the same type.

The FPHA representatives were E. R. Herzog, engineer of the planning division, Seattle, and G. R. West, attorney for the regional office. Representing the city were Mayor Peter Tweed, Councilmen Glen Gillenwater and Elmer Fitzgerald and Recorder George Randle.
