

Rodeo Pursues Set New High

St. Paul—A purse of \$7500, the largest ever offered in the Willamette valley, is posted for this year's 11th annual St. Paul rodeo which opens here July 2 for a three-day show.

In announcing the prize list, President Ray Manegre of the rodeo association said that this amount is one of the largest on the Pacific coast and is topped by only one other wild west show in Oregon.

All six events recognized by the Rodeo Cowboy's Association toward national championships carry \$1000 purses to be divided among the winners at the four shows. These events are the St. Paul featured wild horse race, bronc riding, wild cow milking, Brahma bull riding, bulldogging and calf roping. There will be special prizes totaling \$520, and the remaining prize cash will be distributed among the winners of the St. Paul derby and cowgirl and cowboy races.

Scores of merchandise awards, trophies and a President's trophy for the outstanding cowboy contender of the show are also being offered, Manegre said.

Plans are nearing completion for the Fourth of July street parade, which will feature community riding groups, mounted posies, and decorated entries. The parade will proceed through St. Paul's main street to the rodeo park at 10 a. m. July 4th.

The Tigard union high school band, directed by J. Lamar Bell, has been signed to furnish martial music for the show.

Wild-eyed Brahma bulls making their debut on the rodeo circuit this season with the wild west stock of Harley Tucker, Joseph, are scheduled to furnish many cowboys with a rough time during this July 4th celebration.

More older people are needed, Merrill said, to help pick cherry crops this week, and next week the red raspberry crop will be coming on. All available men are reported to be helping in the hay harvest, which has just begun.
