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Majors Doubt July 4th Rep For Sox and Dodgers Lead

New York, July 1 (AP)—If baseball's July 4 tradition means anything the 1946 World Series will be between the Boston Red Sox and the Brooklyn Dodgers since both clubs were certain today of holding their first place positions on the holiday.

The axiom, which doesn't always work, particularly in the National League, is that the teams leading the pennant races on that mid-season holiday go on to win the flag.

In the past 30 years, the Fourth of July leader went on to win the American League pennant 20 times, whereas the National League leader came through 16 times.

Leads Lengthened

Both the Dodgers and Red Sox improved their margins yesterday with help from their nearest contenders who suffered humiliating defeats from last place teams.

The Dodgers trimmed the Braves at Brooklyn, 4 to 1 as young Rex Barney pitched a four-hitter. Meanwhile, the runner-up Cardinals dropped five and a half games off the pace by losing twice at Pittsburgh, 4 to 3 and 1 to 0. Brooklyn put across three

first inning runs to clinch its fifth straight win in a hurry.

The Phils and Giants divided at Philadelphia a seven-run spree by New York in the ninth inning turned a pitching battle into an 8 to 1 rout in the opener. Johnny Mize hit a grand slam homer in the big inning. The Phils took the second game, 6 to 5 in 10 innings as Pitcher Schoolboy Rowe hit a homer and touched off the winning rally with a double. Mize also homered in that game.

Reds and Cubs Divide

The Reds and Cubs divided at Cincinnati, Chicago taking the opener 6 to 5 as Hibithorn pitched one-hit relief ball for seven and a third innings, then singled in the winning run in the eighth. In the nightcap the Reds put over two runs in the eighth for a 4 to 3 victory.

The Red Sox crushed Washington, 15 to 8, then dropped a 9 to 2 decision in a pair of free-hitting battles at Boston. An eight run first inning in

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which Leon Culberson and Hal Wagner hit homers started Dave (Boo) Ferriss off to an easy 12th victory.

The Yankees dropped eight and a half games behind the Red Sox at New York, losing their second straight game to the last place Athletics 6 to 3.

Hal Newhouse pitched his third shutout of the year and won his 14th game, 1 to 0 and the Tigers also beat the Browns in the second game at St. Louis, 3 to 2 in 10 innings.

The White Sox beat the Indians, 7 to 3 at Chicago, then fought to a 5 to 5 tie in a game called by darkness.
