St. Paul—Even the towns of pioneer days could not take on a more festive air than is noted in this little Willamette valley farming community doing its 11th annual wild west show which began Tuesday night. Professional cowboys from all sections of the west have gathered here with their eyes set on taking home a share of the \$7500 being offered in prize money. In addition, a \$250 cash award and a President's trophy will go to the outstanding performer of the show.

Horse Hunt Starts
For the last three days members of the St. Paul rodeo association have been on a "horse hunt" for the three mavericks which broke the rodeo park corral Saturday and are still running at large in the Willamette valley. Ranchers, especially those living near the river, are asked to contact the rodeo office if they sight these animals, in a trio or singly, crossing their property. The mavericks, part of the herd of 70 which were trucked to St. Paul from Jordan valley three weeks ago for the featured wild horse races of the rodeo, are brown in appearance and because they are untamed they will hie away from captors.

The pre-rodeo behavior of these run-away animals shows that entrants in the wild horse race, a nightly rodeo feature, are having a tough time. Brahma bulls and bucking animals from the Harley Tucker ranch at Joseph are appearing at this rodeo arena for the first time.

The Salem Saddle club was featured in an exhibition riding drill on the opening "Family Night" program. Some 5000 Willamette valley residents were in attendance.

Weather Not Considered
If fair weather continues—and even if it doesn't—the rodeo will go on, President Ray Mangre declared today. Wild west fans needn't stay away if it's sprinkling, for more than 7000 of the 12,000 seats are under cover, he pointed out.

Queen Donna McKay and Princesses Gloria Robinson, Salem, and Bernice Blanchette, St. Paul, will head the colorful July 4th street parade at 10 a. m. The Yamhill county sheriff's posse was the first to sign up for competition in this event, but it is expected that there will also be several other mounted groups in the parade.

Awards will be given to the best junior and senior entries.

Dallas Council Opens Holiday

Dallas — Shooting of fireworks in Dallas will be legal on the Fourth of July, as provided in an amended ordinance passed at a meeting of the city council Monday night, but those who shoot them must get rid of all of them on that date or go elsewhere to have their fun. On July 5 they become illegal within the city limits.

The ordinance is more lenient than it would have been without being amended. Rather than banning the sale of fireworks and the shooting of them entirely, it gives the celebrants one day — Independence day — to observe the day the old-fashioned way. Sale of fireworks is permitted within the city limits seven days prior to July 4. A large section of the center of town, known as the fire limits, will be a prohibited area for the shooting of fireworks. This is bounded by Academy street on the north, Jefferson on the east, Church on the west and Clay on the south.

In passing the amended ordinance, members of the council expressed the hope that parents and children alike would be aware of the privilege extended, so that it would not be necessary to amend the ordinance again to prohibit fireworks in the city limits entirely.

C. B. Sundberg, chairman of the street committee, reported that good progress was being made on the \$42,000 street improvement project and that work had been started by the P. S. Lord company on the storm sewer down Church street.

Woodburn—The city of Woodburn came into formal possession of Settlemier park Monday night when the council accepted the deed to the tract of land. The park will be operated and controlled by the city park association, made up of representative organizations of 22 civic and church organizations of which A. G. Cowan is president.

Hollinshead Heads School at Monmouth

Monmouth—Russell A. Hollinshead, principal the last three years of the Griswold union high school at Helix, has been elected to serve as principal of Monmouth high next year. He succeeds Ermine K. Gentle, who resigned to enter private business. Hollinshead holds a bachelor's degree from Linfield college and has had teaching and administrative experience in various Oregon schools, and was city superintendent for a time at Moro.

Monmouth Asks Longer Streets

Monmouth—The city council, meeting to adopt a budget for 1946-47, made proposals to extend four city streets, Ackerman, Clay, Jackson and Warren, to the city limits or to a contiguous highway. This will open up convenient transportation to many city properties is expected to lead to extensive building construction.

One feature of the newly formulated budget is the allowance of \$3300 salary for city marshal. Thirty years ago about one-tenth of that amount was allotted to the city's chief officer, and even within the last 10 years the salary was about one-third of the new allowance.

City finances were reported in good shape with cash on hand in close balance with bonded indebtedness. A public hearing on adoption of the budget will be held July 18.
