Independence—A move toward getting the Southern Pacific tracks off of Second street was made at this week's meeting of the Chamber of Commerce when President Walter L. Smith appointed a committee to take the matter up with the railroad officials. Members of the committee are Fred Caley, R. M. Walker and M. J. Butler.

Council Okays Street Projects

Woodburn—Three resolutions and six ordinances were passed at the regular meeting of the city council Tuesday night.

Resolutions were to improve First street between West Cleveland and Oak by paving; to pave Settlemier avenue from the west edge of South Front street to Harrison; and to change the grade on Young street to comply with the requirements of the highway commission.

Ordinances passed were: to improve by paving Gatch street from Young to East Lincoln; Brown street from E. Cleveland to Bradley; Oak street from First to Second; resurface East Lincoln from a point 435 feet west of Gatch street to the Pacific highway and to improve by graveling North Third street from the end of the present pavement to the north city limits; and Bradley street from Ogle to Brown street.

Members of the council accepted an invitation to meet with the chamber of commerce at the Laurel cafe at noon July 15. A discussion was held relative to the improvement of Young street and a delegation was appointed to confer with the highway commission.

Mrs. Larson Starts Trip to Homeland

Silverton—Mrs. Carrie Larson spent her last day in Silverton before beginning the first lap of her long trip to Norway, visiting her many friends for a farewell greeting, leaving Wednesday evening by train from Portland for Chicago, where she will visit relatives and friends briefly. She leaves New York July 13 for her homeland.

Mrs. Larson, past 20 years of age, 44 years ago came to the United States, settling in the middlewestern states where she was married. She has been in Silverton much of the time since becoming a citizen of this country. Her husband was killed by accident a number of years ago, and since then Mrs. Larson has made her home with the M. G. Gunderson family. This trip home to be with her two older brothers and scores of other relatives will be her 14th crossing of the Atlantic.

Mt. Angel Sees New Fire Truck

Mt. Angel—At the city council meeting Fire Chief Joseph Bercholt reported that the H. O. W. A. F. D. - Cooper corporation would build the new fire truck for Mt. Angel with the first truck and material available on the Pacific coast.

Mr. Boettiger for Strong and Mac Donald gave estimate price of 2.85 per yard for gravel to be laid to the city dumping grounds. The street committee was authorized to spend not exceeding \$300.00 in graveling such road, and the city attorney, W. Douglas Harris to draw up the agreement. This to be signed by Peter Meissner covering the lease to the grounds.

Ivo Bausman and Gordon Amann, visitors at the meeting, asked about securing improvement for Alder street. G. R. Boatright, engineer, stated he would prepare some cost figures on the improvement.

Boatright discussed proposed drainage project across S. P. Co. right-of-way and suggested the city recorder write the S. P. company that they carry water across its track in the direction of Drain. Boatright explained that 375' x 30" tile and 175' x 24" tile were needed and notice for bids would be published.

Discussion for a survey of Church street for surfacing, and the matter of oiling the space in front of the White Corner Grocery, was held. It was thought that should enough small paving jobs be lined up that a private contractor might be secured to do the work.

Building at Albany Takes Slight Slump

Albany—Building at Albany during June took a nose-dive by comparison with March, April and May activity, but with a total of \$44,000 was nevertheless regarded as creditable in view of material scarcities and federal restrictions.

Permits were issued for 12 dwelling units, it was reported, totaling \$38,250. The remaining \$5750 represented is designed for remodeling or commercial construction.

The June total has brought the grand total of building cost estimates either contemplated and under permit for the first half of this year to \$950,175, and made it virtually certain that the year's total will pass the \$1,000,000 mark for the first time in Albany's history.

Crash Driver Facing Probe

Independence—The Polk county jury will be asked to indict Albert Miller, 27 year old Salem sawmill worker, for involuntary manslaughter following the death of Nancy Temple of Eugene in a Salem hospital, according to District Attorney R. S. Kreason. Kreason said that he would bring the case to the attention of the grand jury as soon as he received an official certification of Miss Temple's death.

Miss Temple was critically injured when the automobile driven by Miller crashed into a car containing nine Monmouth normal school students shortly before midnight, Friday, May 24. The accident occurred at Ninth and Monmouth streets. Virginia Fretwell of Portland and Venus Todd of Sherwood were also seriously injured in the same crash. Others less seriously injured included Clarence Irving of Independence, Wilma McHolick of Monitor, Ethel Lawless of Salem, Norval Carr of Monmouth and Marjorie Campbell and Ethel Pamperin of Portland.

Riding in the car with Miller at the time of the crash were Ralph Crites of Independence and two girl companions, Clover Haynes of Independence and Willie Mahcock of Woodburn. All occupants of the Miller car escaped serious injury.

Miller was arrested following the accident and lodged in jail on charges of reckless driving and driving while drunk but was later released under \$1500 bail. The charges against Miller were not pressed pending progress of the crash victims.

Silverton Has Quiet Holiday

Silverton—Practically no evidence of celebration was in the downtown area of Silverton in observance of the national holiday, a few merchants remembered to place their large flags in front of their places of business, the mail was worked for the boxes at the postoffice, one cafe, George's Place, and Caven-der's confectionery were open for trade, and the Palace theater had afternoon and evening shows.

Hundreds of cars went through town via the loop to the Silver Falls state park and other mountain resorts in small groups for the day's pleasures. With the weather perfect for outdoor celebrations, the city park was popular in a quiet way and with the municipal swimming pool and wading tank for toddlers, more than 200 automobiles were counted at

the two parking spaces. The Mt. Angel Legion and auxiliary annual picnic drew the largest single group of picnickers to the city park.

Silverton residents, generally, visited one or more of the neighboring towns that put on carnivals or rodeos for all day on the Fourth and for the three-day evening shows.

The "dealers" in firecrackers and sparklers ran out of wares early in the day, with the result that the renewal of booms and miniature fireworks of the first of the week were a minus quantity. Granted that some of the old-timer celebrants balked at buying the \$1-per packages that they used to buy for a thin dime, might have helped the quiet tone of the day.
